Case For Three Detectives — Leo Bruce. This is possibly the most unusual mystery ever written. A murder is committed, behind closed doors, in bizarre circumstances. Three amateur detectives take the case. Each arrives at his own brilliant solution.

The Fifth Horseman — Larry Collins and Dominique LaPierre. The threat of Libya's Colonel Qaddafi to explode a three-megaton nuclear bomb hidden in New York, unless an autonomous Palestinian state is immediately established, affects the lives of ordinary citizens, politicians, secret agents and terrorists from Washington to Jerusalem.

Loon Lake — E. L. Doctorow. In the Great Depression of the 1930's, a tempestuous young man from Paterson, New Jersey, who has been both a hobo and carnival roustabout, finds himself lost one night beside a single-track railroad in the Adirondack Mountains.

The Florentine Table — Paul Durst. Liz Armacost receives a table for her birthday and her husband Ray notices that the face on

the table seems to change — angelic faces becoming ghastly, leering visages — as a series of peculiar deaths occur.

The Blue Guitar — Nicholas Hasluck. Charming, adventurous and ambitious, Dyson Garrick suffers from one fatal flaw — his reluctance to harm anyone — a flaw which causes him, unwittingly, to betray his wife, his mistress, his manager and himself.

Firestarter — Stephen King. Participation in an experiment by a covert government agency left Andy McGee with a psychic power and produced even stronger, more menacing abilities in his daughter — and now the agency will stop at nothing to get control of the young girl.

Consequence Of Crime — Elizabeth Linington.

In this briskly paced, meticulously detailed police story, the famous LAPD's team of Ivor and Sue Maddox cope with a knifing, a series of women assaulted and raped in a laundromat, murder of a bit-time TV star, a knife-wielding wedding party, a flasher, two kidnapped girls and an "ape man" killer.

A Wayside Tavern — Norah Lofts. The history of England from the time the Romans were driven out to the present is told through the stormy history of a wayside inn and a chapel built near it.

New Lives For Former Wives — Nancy Baker. Discusses the problems of women who have centered their lives around their homes and then find themselves forced into the job market by divorce, separation, or death of a spouse and offers advice on how to handle these problems.

Dancing Without Music — Beryl L. Benderly. Discusses various aspects of deafness — what it is and its varying degrees, the impact of deafness on an individual and those around him, the different causes of deafness and its psychological and social implications.

Encyclopedia Of Wood — Forests Product Laboratory. You'll find everything you need to know and more, from chapters on structure, physical and mechanical properties, lumber stress grades, gluing, and plywood — to moisture control, fire resistance, paint-

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ing, finishing and preservation.

Soon To Be A Major Motion Picture — Abbie Hoffman. The famous American fugitive and Yippie founder tells of his beginnings in Worcester, Mass., his school years and involvement in the civil rights movement and other events and crusades that have changed American culture.

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REP. RICHARD W. MANGUS OPINION POLL FOR 1981

Now that State Representative Richard W. Mangus (R-Lakeville) is back in Indianapolis for the 1981 session of the Indiana General Assembly, he wants to take with him the results of a local opinion poll as a guide to his decision-making.

Mangus is asking District 10 citizens to take a moment to complete the short questionnaire on proposals expected to come before the House for a vote.

The completed poll should be returned to him at the House of Representatives, Room 401-5, State House, Indianapolis, Indiana 46219.

Mangus urged participants to include any additional comments about the issues raised in the poll with their response.

"I am looking forward to a productive and interesting session," Mangus said.

The Legislative Services Agency which drafts bills for legislators, is projecting that about 2,240 bills will be introduced during the 61 day session, and they will touch on such issues as reduced revenues, jobs, hazardous waste disposal, reapportionment and lobby reform, to name a few.

"I value the views of my constituents on these matters, and am hopeful the poll response will be heavy," Mangus concluded.
