For example, always keep your thermostat set at the lowest possible temperature setting. One that's two to four degrees less than what you're used to.

Make sure your furnace filters are clean and replaced when necessary. When your fireplace is not in use, make certain the damper is tightly shut.

Check for air leaks and cracks around your windows and doors. Add weatherstripping or caulking where needed. Keep the opening of outside doors to a minimum. Keep the doors and vents of unused rooms closed. Don't block your heating vents or cold air returns with carpet or furniture.

And finally, open your draperies on sunny days; take advantage of the sun's warmth.

No matter how insignificant these little energy-saving practices may seem, collectively they can all work to lower your heating costs.
