

DAIRYMEN WISH A NEW MILK CLASSIFICATION

PASTEURIZATION NOT ALWAYS EFFECTIVE, THEY SAY.

SMALL TOWNS COMPLAIN

The proposal that milk produced under ordinary conditions be labeled Class B, raw or pasteurized, and that milk produced under strictly modern sanitary conditions be labeled Class A, raw or pasteurized, was laid before the state board of health by representatives of the state dairymen's association, Wednesday. The dairymen offered objection to milk rules recently adopted by the health board. The health board rules would permit milk produced under prescribed sanitary conditions to be sold raw and labeled Class A; and milk produced under other conditions to be sold only after pasteurization and labeled Class B.

Say Pasteurization Uncertain.
The dairymen pointed out that such rules would permit the offering of any milk for sale, if it is pasteurized. It was agreed by persons at the conference that "pasteurization as pursued in Indiana now is worse than none." One dairymen said that "pasteurization sometimes is dependent on how big a hurry they are in down at the barn."

Representations that it is impractical to require pasteurization in small towns were laid before the board, with the suggestion that ordinary milk sold there be labeled Class B in order that consumers may know they are buying second grade milk, and therefore begin to develop conditions favoring the production of Class A milk.

Night Limit Production.
Dr. Hugh A. Cowing, president of the health board, said that too stringent milk rules might limit production and increase the price of milk, thereby depriving some communities of their supply. Dr. J. N. Hurty, secretary of the board, took the position that the elimination of unguarded milk would work no ultimate hardship on a community.

Street Car Fare Petition.
A petition to establish a 5-cent street car fare with free transfer privileges in Hammond, Whiting and East Chicago was filed with the public service commission Wednesday by the Hammond, Whiting & East Chicago Railway Company. The com-

pany proposes a 3 1/2 cents fare for children going to and from school. It requests that the proposed rates go into effect June 1.

Texas Women May Vote.
AUSTIN, Tex., April 22.—The state supreme court has overruled a motion for a hearing in the woman suffrage case, sustaining the law permitting women to vote in Texas party primaries.

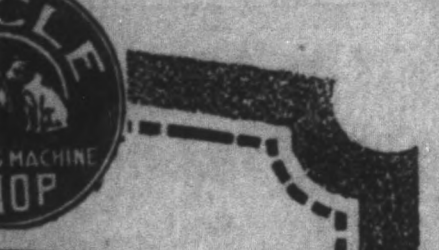
