

SHELBYVILLE NOT IN FAVOR WITH COAL MEN

WARTIME FAVORS NOT REMEMBERED, SOME SAY.

CITY BUILDINGS NEED FUEL

(Special to The Indianapolis News)
SHELBYVILLE, Ind., October 14.—Considerable difficulty may be had in obtaining coal for municipal buildings here, the city hall and the city fire station. This information has been received by Mayor Lee B. Hoop from Jesse E. Eickbach, chairman of the state coal commission.
Recently Mayor Hoop sent a written request to Mr. Eickbach asking the aid of the state coal commission in obtaining fuel for the city buildings. There is now only a small amount of coal at each place and the city has been unable to get more. Chairman Eickbach's reply to Mayor Hoop follows:
"We have taken up with several

friendly operators the matter of supplying your city with some coal and we have found this situation:
"It seems that during the great scarcity of coal in war times some operators undertook to supply your city with coal, expecting to be put on your list of customers and to be furnished with orders from time to time for your city uses. They claim that just as soon as the great emergency was over, they immediately began purchasing your coal from other sources, and they were without customers.
"This was an unfortunate situation, it is true, and it begins to look as if the only way we can secure coal for your city will be by a formal order on some mine, and this we hesitate to issue just now."

Coal Shortage at Columbus.

COLUMBUS, Ind., October 14.—Approximately 40 per cent. of the householders in Columbus are without coal, according to local dealers, and only the unusually warm weather has prevented suffering. The majority of men who handle coal practically have none in their yards. It is said the factories of the city have only a small quantity of coal on hand and are operating on very close margins. The situation will not be improved during the coming winter, dealers say.

TAGGART SAYS LEAGUE IS SURE TO BE ADOPTED

OPPOSITION OF "OLD GUARD" OF NO AVAIL, HE BELIEVES.

ADDRESS IN LAKE COUNTY

GARY, Ind., October 14.—In a speech here today during a tour of Lake county, Thomas Taggart, Democratic candidate for United States senator from Indiana, made a strong appeal for the league of nations and for business administration in the congress.
"Economy in government is just as essential as economy in one's own business," he said. "Waste of money in the conduct of government is just as burdensome to the average citizen because it brings higher taxes and a greater burden on the individual."
Mr. Taggart recounted the deeds and heroism of the women of the

country during the world war, in discussing the league of nations, and what it means to the motherhood of the country.
"Women know what war means my friends," he said. "Every shot that is fired strikes them in their hearts, each drum beat, each bugle call brings to them a feeling of dread. The mothers of America gave their sons to the flag. Millions of our boys kissed them goodbye, but the kiss of thousands of brave American boys was the kiss of farewell forever.
"If the Republicans say to you that the league of nations endangers any liability to war they either do not know what the league is or they are wilfully misrepresenting the facts. The league of nations stands for peace. There will be no more war when it is adopted—and it will be adopted in spite of the Hardings

HUMANE SOCIETY WISHES HOME FOR STRAY ANIMALS

SOUTH BEND, Ind., October 14.—"We had millions of soldiers and it would be monstrous if the courts suspended sentences because boys were soldiers. We would have no protection for society if sentences in criminal cases were suspended merely because youths were in the army."

thieves who had been found guilty in the St. Joseph circuit court. The statement followed a request for mercy for Harry Carlson, age eighteen, and Joseph Burns, age twenty, who were sentenced to the Indiana Reformatory for one to fourteen years.


Citizens Will Be Asked to Give \$25,000 for Erection of Shelter House.
Citizens of Indianapolis soon will be asked by the Indianapolis Hu-

mane Society to give \$25,000 for the erection of a shelter home for animals. At present the only refuge for stray cats and dogs is the municipal dog pound in the yards of the city cleaning department at East New York street and the Monon railroad.
The quarters it is said, are too cramped to permit the necessary accommodations for a city the size of Indianapolis. In 1919, 3,884 dogs alone passed through the hands of the society, and most of them were sheltered for a time at the city dog pound.
A site has been acquired at Shriver avenue and Fall Creek boulevard and plans have been drawn for the shelter home, which will have adequate facilities to accommodate the needs of the work for years to come. The officials of the Indianapolis Hu-
