

GIVES FURTHER DETAILS OF PRISONERS' MUTINY

A. F. DOWD DESCRIBES DEATH OF H. C. McGRANAHAN.

RECORDS OF MEN ARE GIVEN

(Special to The Indianapolis News)
JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., October 14.—Alfred F. Dowd, state agent at the Indiana Reformatory, returned here last night and J. H. McCafferty and Helen C. Vial, assistant state agents, who assisted him in convey-

ing a party of twenty-two reformatory prisoners to the State Prison left for other points on other business of the institution.
Mr. Dowd gave further details of the mutiny on the train near San Pierre, in which Herbert C. McGranahan, one of the prisoners, was shot through the body by Vial and killed. The officers had noticed an under-

current of unrest and had prevented notes being passed.
Guard Is Attacked.
Ralph Richwine, sent here from Indianapolis, for highway robbery, and William Bell, Vigo county, who were shackled together and sat near one end of the car, started the trouble. They went to the toilet and in coming out turned on McCafferty, who had followed them, and each seized his arm. He backed into a corner and braced himself against the wall to prevent them getting his revolver.
Dowd started to his aid and was tripped by George Fletcher, of Vanderburgh county, who is serving his second sentence. Dowd fell between the seats. At the same moment McGranahan and Clyde Johnson, Allen county, who were shackled together, started for Vial, who fired. Johnson, Richwine and Bell threw up their hands and surrendered. Richwine and Charles Kurtz, who also was in the party, came here from Marion county for highway robbery.
Richwine Escaped From Farm.
Richwine was here previously under the name of Goodwin and escaped from the institution farm. Kurtz served time here and at Michigan City under the name of Myers. He escaped at the time of his arrest, was wounded by the police and later escaped from the detention ward of the City Hospital at Indianapolis. It is said Johnson, who was shackled to McGranahan, was the partner of Leslie Williams in a robbery for which they were convicted in Allen county. Williams tried to climb over the wall of the institution in broad daylight and fell, suffering fatal injuries a few months ago.

Reidy was appointed to the police department March 15, 1911, and July 6, 1915, was promoted to the traffic squad. He later was reduced to patrolman. He is survived by a widow, two sons, Joseph, age four, and John, age six, and one brother, Thomas Reidy, a bicycle policeman at station No. 2.
