We are authorized to announce JOHN H. THOMPSON Esq. of Clark county, a candidate for Governor at the next August election.

To make room for Mr. Markley's address "to the public," and some other articles of a political nature, a number of items of news foreign and domestic has been crowded out; among the latter the confession of Hill, the Murderer of Morgan, which we promised in our last. The foreign news of the day is of little importance to the American reader, and its place most generally can be more profitably occupied by that of domestic manufacture, tho' it should be politics. Now and then we have a little from the Greeks, but it is as exaggerated and uncertain in most instances, as a combination of circumstances can make it. Late accounts state that the Porte had rejected in the strongest terms all interferences of the Allied Powers for the pacification of the affairs of Greece, and that the ambassadors of the Allies had applied for passports to leave the Turkish Capitol.

The annual elections in New York commenced on Monday the 5th inst. and ended on Wednesday following.—In the city of New York the election of members to the Legislature was very warmly contested on the presidential question. The entire Jackson ticket is stated to have succeeded. The New York Enquirer says that upward of 20,000 votes were polled in the city. We have no accounts from any other part of the state.

The Geneva N. Y. Gazette says "the body found at Oak Orchard creek which resembled William Morgan so exactly as to produce the fullest conviction that it could be none other but his, turns out to be that of Timothy Monroe—was again disinterred, on Monday, and we understand after a thorough investigation it was given up to his friends to be taken to Canada."

The season for making contracts for the transportation of the Mail on a part of the vast line of the United States' Roads is over, and the competitors are dispersed to their respective homes. The Office Department have had an arduous time of it, but, with very few exceptions, we believe, the parties are satisfied with the decision between them which have been made by the Postmaster General.

Some changes have effected in the mode and time of carrying the Mail, still adding to the present facilities of the Post Office Establishment. For instance, the mail, after the first of January next, will be conveyed from Washington and Baltimore to Cincinnati, in Ohio, in SIX DAYS, in stages seven trips weekly. It is now conveyed but six trips weekly, and requires seven and a half days.

To Louisville, from the above places, the mail stage, after January, will run daily, taking eight days; the time now required being ten days.

From Louisville to Nashville, a mail stage will run six trips weekly.

On all the important mail routes, there has been great increase of expedition provided for, as well as additional accommodation on many of them, by an increase of the number of weekly trips.

A male stage will run weekly from Lexington, Ky. by Barboursville through Tennessee, and a part of North Carolina so as connect with a line of mail stage which run from Columbia, South Carolina.

These are a few of the improvements.

From a detailed statement in the Nashville Republican, it appears that the Legislature of Tennessee consists of 61 members, 20 Senators, and 41 Representatives. Of whom there are 19 lawyers, 4 merchants, 1 mechanic, and thirty-six farmers. 27 are natives of Virginia, 14 of Tennessee, 12 of North Carolina, 4 of South Carolina, 2 of Pennsylvania, 2 of Kentucky, and 1 of Delaware. And among the whole are eight Bachelors, 4 in each branch.
