TEMPERANCE AND MORAL SOCIETY		
Of Rising Sun and its vicinity.		
On Sunday first inst. a circular from the Madison Temperance society was read in public at Rising Sun, setting forth the importance of appointing delegates to meet at Indianapolis on the 9th of December next, to form a State Temperance Society.		
The Citizens were accordingly requested to meet on the evening of the 8th inst. to take the subject into consideration.		
At the time appointed, a large concourse of people assembled at the church and proceeded to organize a society, and adopted the following constitution, viz:		
Constitution of the Temperance and moral Society of Rising Sun and its vicinity		
Whereas the improper use of intoxicating liquors has been found by experience to be the source of evils of incalculable magnitude, alike destructive to the interests of individuals, families, and communities; and whereas the prevalence of this vice has such a fatal efficacy in hindering the success of all the common means which have been appointed for the moral and religious improvement of men; and whereas the various measures, which the friends of morality have adopted, though not altogether unsuccessful, have been found quite insufficient to give any effectual or permanent check to this desolating evil; and whereas we believe some more vigorous means are evidently required,—some system of instruction and action which will make a steady and powerful impression on the present and following generations; and will, in this way, ultimately effect a change of public sentiment and practice in regard to the use of intoxicating liquors;—therefore the friends of domestic and social happiness, now present, resolve to form a society, and agree to be governed by the following constitution, namely,		
Art. 1. The society shall be called "The Temperance & moral Society of Rising Sun and its vicinity."		
Art. 2. The object of this Society shall be, to suppress intemperance, by discountenancing, both by precept and example, the use of ardent spirits except as a medicine; to promote good morals generally.		
Art. 3. Any person may become a member by subscribing to this Constitution.		
Art. 4. The officers of this society shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, and committee of correspondence,—all of whom shall remain in office until others are chosen.		
Art. 5. It shall be the duty of the president to preside in all meetings of the society, and of the committee, and in his absence the Vice president: the secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the society and committee.		
Art. 6. It shall be the duty of the corresponding committee to labor, by all suitable means to promote the object of this society: to call the attention of persons of all ages to the magnitude of the evil this society aims to prevent, and to the immeasurable good which it aims to secure, by obtaining and circulating pamphlets which have already been published, or by preparing and publishing essays of their own, on the evils of intemperance. This committee shall consist of twelve, including the president, vice president and secretary. They shall meet on their own adjournments, or at the call of the presiding officer, or any two members of the committee, and any four members shall constitute a quorum to do business at any meeting duly called. The committee shall moreover have power to fill their own vacancies.		
Art. 7. The regular meetings of this society shall be held quarterly; extra meetings may be called by the committee of correspondence.		
Art. 8. Societies auxiliary to this may be formed, whose delegates shall be entitled to seats in the meetings of this society.		
Art. 9. No alterations or amendments shall be made to this constitution, except by the consent of three fourths of		

the members present, at a regular meeting of the society.

One hundred and seventeen persons gave their names to the foregoing, viz: 59 gentlemen, and 58 ladies.

The Society were then presented for a year, by a member, with the Journal of Humanity, the weekly periodical of the American Temperance Society.

The entire unanimity with which every measure was adopted by the Society, and the deep interest excited with relation to the subject, both in the place and vicinity were such, as at once, to surprise and gratify the friends of good order and morality.

The next meeting of the society is to be held in the church, at Rising Sun, the last Saturday of February, 1830
