

PALLADIUM.

Saturday Morning, July 26.

We see it stated that T. P. Moore and R. P. Letcher are in the field for Congress in the 5th district, Kentucky. The contest will no doubt be one of great warmth, as well as personal violence. "Knock down and drag out," it is feared will be the order of the day. The election commences on the 1st Monday in August.

The Cincinnati Republican of the 23d instant, quotes flour at \$4 to 4 12 per bbl., and whiskey at 20 to 24 cts per gallon. The same paper represents the health of the city to be as good as usual for the season.

The Patriot Bank, Washington city, has resumed specie payments. The suspension in its operations is attributed to a connivance on the part of its managers to assist the U. S. Bank to raise the money panic; but failing in that, it has thought it most advisable to resume its usual business.

The Ohio river has risen several feet since our last publication. The navigation is unusually good for the season, and business tolerably lively along the river.

We would caution our country friends not to be too ready in crediting the many reports which may reach them, in reference to the health of this place, and the adjacent towns on the river. Whenever any real cause of danger exists, we shall not fail to advise our readers of it. At present no disease of a pestilential character exists here, nor has a single case we believe occurred here this summer; though we are free to admit that around in the neighborhood a greater number of persons are now on the sick list than usual—principally bilious fevers. The citizens of this place generally enjoy good health. The same remark, we believe, may be applied to those of Rising Sun, where it was reported a few days since the cholera was raging to an alarming extent. Two or three cases, perhaps, of that disease occurred there, in the last 8 or 10 days—not more.

Mr. Merrill, president of the State Bank, passed through this place a few days since on his way home from New York city. We learn that he speaks encouragingly of the prospects of negotiating the state loan on favorable terms, and also of the bank's going into operation this fall, at least in November.

It will be seen by an article published below that by a late arrangement, the names of Col. Johnson Watts and Horace Bassett, Esq., are withdrawn from the list as candidates for Senator, in this county, and that of Rev. DANIEL PLUMMER, substituted in their place. We presume this has been done by and with the consent of the gentlemen named; but whether or not, we wish no responsibility to rest upon us in the premises, and in discontinuing the names of the gentlemen named, we do it under an expectation that the Wilmington meeting will stand between us and harm.

We present our readers to-day with the speech of Mr. LANE, delivered in the house of representatives on the subject of the public money and the United States Bank. We are not much in the habit of complimenting or praising the doings of public men, but in justice to our representative, we cannot well let this occasion pass without expressing our approbation of the matter, style, and manner of this speech. It exhibits a mind well practiced, great reasoning powers, clear judgment, and in all does honor to the man and the district he represents.

It is out of the question—beyond all reason—to ask or expect us to write this hot weather. The few ideas we are enabled to scratch into existence, immediately become rarified and pass off in steam, before it is possible to condense them into lines. We hope for a shower—a cooling breeze—and that our readers will, for the present, excuse our editorial brevity.

At a meeting of the Committee of Election, for Dearborn county, held at Wilmington on the 24th of July, inst.; pursuant to a call of a large number of citizens of different parts of the county, JOHN MYERS was called to the chair, in the absence of James Walker, Esq. the standing chairman; and Henry Hopkins was elected secretary. The meeting being organized, the chairman briefly explained the object of the meeting, which was to nominate a candidate for the Senate of State, in the room of Johnson Watts and Horace Bassett. On motion of Mr. Thomas K. Coles, Daniel Plummer, of Manchester, was nominated for State Senator and carried—all the members voting in the affirmative but one. On motion, it was agreed that the proceedings be signed by the chairman and secretary and published in the Palladium, Indiana Whig, and Rising Sun Times, and that those several papers be requested insert the name of said Daniel Plummer on the list of candidates for State Senator, and strike from the list of candidates the names of Col. Johnson Watts and Horace Bassett, Esq.; and wish the co-operation of all the friends of a removal of the county seat, of this Dearborn county, to carry these matters into effect. And no more business presenting, on motion, the committee adjourned.
