

# PALLADIUM.

Saturday Morning, Jan. 24.

A meeting will be held this evening at early candle lighting, at Mr. Hunt's Hotel, for the purpose of taking into consideration subjects of internal improvement. A general attendance is desired, and respectfully requested.

We publish on the first page of this paper, the report of the Engineers of the White Water canal. It will be read with interest by the friends of internal improvements.

The Rushville Herald says, that Oliver H. Smith, Esq. will not be a candidate for Congress in the 5th district, at the ensuing election. The contest will be between Hon. Jonathan M. Carly and James Rariden, Esq.

The Pittsburgh Democrat of a late date says, that orders have been received at the United States Arsenal, near that city, to ship at the earliest period for New Orleans, near a hundred cannon of the largest calibre. The regular number were brought to the wharf, but the sudden freezing of the river prevented their transportation.

We tender our thanks to Messrs. Hendricks and Tipton of the Senate; and Messrs. Lane, Ewing, Boon, Kinnard, and Carr, of the House, for their kind attention in forwarding to us many valuable public documents.

Mr. Clay, from the committee on Foreign Relations, has made a report on that part of the President's Message relating to our claims on France, for indemnification. We have not seen the whole report, but understand it is dictated in the mildest terms, and fully sustains the views the President entertains upon the subject, with the exception of making reprisals on French property. This he thinks ought not to be resorted to, even in the contingency of no appropriation being made at the present session of the French Chambers for the fulfillment of the stipulated treaty; but is willing to wait longer the pleasure of France. Truly, Mr. Clay is disposed to show France great lenity and forbearance in this matter. How long would he suffer himself to be tampered in this way by an individual, who, after having acknowledged himself to be indebted to him for a certain sum of money, protracted pay day from month to month, and year to year, until twenty-five years had elapsed? Would he say to him, I am willing to wait a little longer? or would he resort to summary measures to insure its payment? We are much mistaken in the man, if the latter would not be the course pursued. And yet, he is willing to wait on France, probably half a century, for a debt justly due us, rather than take measures towards her, that he would cheerfully enforce upon his own constituents? Certainly, France should feel grateful for this uncalculated intercession in her behalf.

No person more earnestly desires a peaceable adjustment of this difficulty than we do—but, notwithstanding this, we think some decisive measure should be adopted by Congress at the present session for the speedy conclusion of the matter. Further delay appears useless on our part, as the Chambers were convoked at an early day for the express purpose of making provisions for the fulfillment of the treaty, and if no appropriation be made for this purpose, at its present session, it will appear manifest they do not intend to carry it into effect at all. Where, then, is the use of delay or procrastination? Every day's suspense only serves to make it worse, if seizures are finally to be resorted to on our part, which inevitably must be the case, or acknowledge that we have asked that which is not due: or are willing to submit to that which is wrong.

Gen. W. H. Harrison was nominated by a large meeting of the citizens of Hamilton county, held at Chivort, on the 10th inst., as a candidate for President of the United States. There appears to be great partiality manifested, at present, for the General's claims to this high office, by the people, not only of Ohio, but in several other States of the Union.

The Pennsylvania Intelligencer, in speaking of the public mind in that quarter on the subject of the next Presidency, says, that he received a letter not long since, from a Jackson man, containing ten subscribers (only their names, we suppose) to his paper, in consequence of the stand he had taken in favor of General Harrison for President. Well, this is liberal, and if accompanied with the cash, the Editor will be enabled to press forward to the consummation of his purpose, with better spirits, than though he had hitched himself to the car of some unprincipled demagogue, whose dark and delusory deeds have rendered him odious to the American People.

The Editor of the Wabash Courier, in noticing the demise of several papers of late, in this State, and the total absence of any regular system by which to secure the future health and prosperity of the living, proposes a convention of Editors, to assemble at Indianapolis, early in the spring, for the purpose of devising some proper panacea for the debilitated condition of the press in general. We are decidedly in favor of such an arrangement, provided the time agreed upon for assembling be not too early—say the first Monday in May, when most likely the roads will be good.

The resolution introduced in the House of Representatives by Mr. Gamble, noticed last week, inquiring of the Secretary of the Treasury, whether or not, in his opinion, the Department can safely keep and disburse the public moneys without the agency of a bank or banks, &c., was taken up on the 3d inst., and, after considerable debate, on motion, the resolution was laid on the table, by a vote of 106 to 87. So that by this vote we may infer that the House considers a bank or banks indispensable for the safe keeping of the public funds.

Hon. Thomas H. Benton, has declined the nomination of the State Convention of Mississippi as a candidate for Vice President of the United States. His letter to the committee, declining the nomination, and defending or exposing the many unfounded charges preferred against Mr. Van Buren by his enemies, is clear, able and conclusive; and breathes a spirit only worthy of such disinterested patriots. Its length shall not preclude its publication at a proper time.

The Legislature of Kentucky, on the 9th inst., elected John J. Crittenden, Esq. United States Senator, for six years from the 4th of March next, in place of Geo. M. Bibb, Esq. whose term of service will then expire. Mr. Bibb, it seems, was not a candidate for re-election. The contest was between Crittenden and Guthrie. The vote stood for Crittenden 94, and for Guthrie 40.

Bills are in progress in the Legislature for establishing Independent Banks at Maysville, Lexington and Louisville. The bill provides that the Bank at Louisville shall have a capital of 3,000,000 dollars.

Our last western mail brought us nothing from Indianapolis, but what is contained under our legislative head. The only important bill that has passed the house since our last publication is the one for introducing the ad valorem system of taxation. This bill passed on the 17th inst., by a vote of 42 to 33. It is thought it will also pass the senate by a small majority.

On the news of the dissolution of the late French Ministry, reaching Prince Talleyrand, then ambassador at the Court of Great Britain, he immediately returned to Paris. It is supposed he will not resume his seat in the British Court.
