

## DEPORTED REDS TO ARRIVE IN RUSSIA TODAY

Emma Goldman Sends Love to  
Friends and Enemies in  
United States.

### PARTY FROM ARK 'SOBER'

HANGO, Finland, Jan. 19.—The 249 radicals deported from the United States reached Hango, the last station before they cross the Russian border at 2 p. m. today.

They left Hango yesterday on a special train, guarded by fifty Finnish "white guards" and American immigration authorities. Miss Olga Erickson, who is attached to the American commissioner's office at Helsingfors, accompanied the party.

The reds will be escorted to the Finnish-Russian border at the bridge at Teekki. Finnish authorities have assured the Americans there will be a cessation of hostilities between the forces and the soviet troops while the radicals are crossing the bridge into Russia.

### SOVIETS PLEDGE NONINTERFERENCE.

The Russian soviet government, it was said, has assured the American and Finnish authorities, its troops will not molest the reds as they enter Russia. The party was expected to cross the Finnish-Russian border either late Sunday or early Monday. Their ultimate destination is Petrograd.

The sun was just setting when the train carrying the former American radicals steamed out of Hango. The reds appeared unusually sober.

"I start for Russia with mingled emotions," Emma Goldman said, just before the train departed. "Of course, I want to see what is ahead but I leave much that is dear behind. I send my regards and love to all in America, both enemies and friends."

Search of the radicals' baggage before it was put aboard the train, revealed some instances of pilfering of property from the Buford, which carried the party from New York to Hango.

Each member of the party was provided with five days' army ration.

Officials said the party would be escorted only as far as the Finnish side of the border. From there they must carry their baggage into Russia.

## SAYS DEPORTEES ARE HELP TO RUSS

BERLIN, Jan. 19.—Russia welcomes the return of bolshevik sympathizers deported from the United States for Russia requires either German or American help for construction, declared Carl Radek, former chief of the propaganda section of the soviet government and formerly Lenin's main lieutenant in Germany, today.

Radek was sent out of the country by Germany, being sent out of the country by way of Poland, but he gave a long and important interview, setting forth his impressions before he left.

A report has been received from the United States that Ludwig Martens, the so-called "soviet ambassador," was about to be deported.

"So they may deport Martens and keep George Bakmeteff, the minister of a nonexistent Russian government," he commented. "Bakmeteff is living upon money from unfilled Russian war contracts."

"We would be glad if Martens returned. He is an engineer of the highest technical ability and such are needed for the reconstruction of Russia. We use all that the United States has deported. Their education and experience in America will be valuable to our government. But you Americans should have put your State of Liberty on board the deportation ship, sending it to Moscow along with the bolsheviks."

Radek then went into a long political dissertation declaring that the United States is not free, but is autocratic, whereas Russia is the new land of freedom.
