## SAYS AMERICA IS LOSING IN BIDS FOR BOUT

Cochrane Assets Conditions are Unsatisfactory in States for Staging Title Match.

## CARPENTIER TO REST

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Charles B. Cochrane, the London promoter who has been here several weeks trailing Jack Dempsey with a contract signed by Georges Carpenter, has booked passage to return Saturday. He said here today he had not worried if he did not hear Dempsey's name, as the Frenchman is valid any place in the world," he said.

He further declared he would not stage the fight in America as conditions were not satisfactory and if future developments demanded the fight here he would go to Canada. He is the only American promoter. When asked about the statement of Desamps that he held only an option on the Frenchman's services until Feb. 1, he said:

"I am tired denying that. Just wait and see; that will be the best way to prove my claim that I have a full fledged contract already sealed by a payment of \$25,000."

## Amateur Feds Plan Enlargement of Activity and Adopt New Rules

CLEVELAND, Jan. 19.—An effort to restrict the amateur class to players who had never played professional baseball failed in the annual meeting of the National Amateur Baseball Federation. After reconsideration it was voted that any associations should take up the question and report at the March meeting. Several changes in the playing rules were made. To enter the club, a club must contain a league must start the season with at least six clubs and finish with at least four.

Winning industrial teams of each city must pay to the federation an entrance fee of \$50 before they can enter intercity competition. Semi-pro teams must pay \$100. The amateur class is a series of championship intercity series which each association pays to the federation. These fees raise \$10 per cent. Those cities not in the amateur class, the championship contests must give 15 per cent of funds derived from other games, the minimum to be \$300.

A movement was launched to expand the graduation to professional all parks of the country. The president will appoint regional chairmen who will visit cities in their districts. James F. Pitts, former director of recreation of Cleveland, was appointed secretary by the board of directors. Cleveland was selected as headquarters.

The regular intercity championship meeting will be held at Cincinnati in July. The board of directors will meet in March at Detroit or Pittsburgh.
