Irish Will Celebrate in True Native Style Here Next Wednesday.

TWO FLAGS FOR DISPLAY

St. Patrick's day—Wednesday, March 17—will be celebrated in true Irish fashion.

The Irish green flags are being unfurled, tinted and the shamrocks unfurled.

An elaborate program has been prepared, including a parade, which will be held at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. William M. Moran of Mattoon, Ill., district attorney, will be the orator of the day, addressing a mass meeting in Tomlinson hall immediately after the parade.

The celebration is to be in charge of the Ancient Order of Hibernians of Marion county. Joseph M. Cangany is chairman of the committee in charge of the arrangements and William J. Barrett is secretary.

SOLEMN HIGH MASS

The celebration will begin with solemn high mass at St. John's church at 9 a.m., celebrated by Rt. Rev. Monsignor Francis Gavask, chaplain of the county order of Hibernians.

T. J. Blackwell has been named grand marshal of the parade, which will form at Meridian and Vermont streets, George Rice, band leader, the first division, Thomas O'Connell, the second and P. J. Sheridan the third. The parade will pass through the downtown section.

Timothy Harrington, past grand knight of the Knights of Columbus, will preside at the mass meeting. The resolutions committee, of which W. H. Foley is chairman, is expected to present resolutions dealing with the question of the freedom of speech. George Dixon of St. Anthony's church will speak on the religious significance of the observance.

TWO FLAGS TO BE CARRIED IN PARADE.

All merchants in the parade are asked to display the Stars and Stripes and the flag of the Irish "republic," green, white and orange.

St. Patrick, called the apostle of Ireland, was born near the close of the fourth century in Brittany, in the north of France. His father was a Roman soldier. The Irish had long been at war with the Gauls and in an incursion into Brittany Patrick was taken captive.

Then 16, he served as a herder of cattle in the north of Ireland for several years. He escaped from captivity, returned to France, became a hermit and was commissioned Apostle to Ireland by Pope Celestine, who died in 432.

LIBRARIANS TO ASK MORE PAY

Qualifications Same as Teachers, but Salary Less.

Salary increases for librarians throughout the state will be sought by a committee of the Indiana Library association and the Indiana Library Trustees' association, headed by Miss Ethel McCollough of the Evansville public library, it was announced today at the office of the Indiana public library commission.

Difficulty is being experienced in obtaining qualified employees for libraries in many cities, it was said. Salaries paid to librarians are much lower than those paid to school teachers, although the qualifications are similar.

The annual meeting of the two state library organizations will be held at the Hotel Seville here Nov. 10 to 12, it was announced. The dates were selected at a meeting of the executive committees of the two associations in the office of the state commission yesterday.

Miss Margaret Wade of the Anderson library was appointed chairman of the committee on the convention program. Members of the entertainment committee appointed were Miss Florence Venn of the state library commission, chairman; Miss Elizabeth Ohr of the Indianapolis public library and Miss Elizabeth Ronan of the library commission.

Consumers Back Up Power Rate Boost

Four consumers of power in Crawfordsville joined with the management of the municipally owned light and power plant of that city, is requesting that rates be raised in a petition filed with the state public service commission today.

The power patrons who joined the city in the petition were the Crawfordsville Wire and Nail Company, the Crawfordsville Shale Brick Company, the Standard Shale Brick Company and the Boston Paving Brick Company.

Under the present rate the factories get power as cheaply as \$1.35 per kilowatt hour. The commission is asked to fix the minimum rate at \$1.65 per kilowatt hour net.

Refuses Divorce in Case Tried Secretly

Mrs. Mussman contested the case. The courtroom was heard behind closed doors, newspapermen being asked to leave the courtroom.




