

LONDON FACES OUR PROBLEMS

Same After-War Conditions Are Stirring Over There.

LONDON, March 19.—Is the difference between life in London and in New York pretty much one of accent in speaking the English language?

It would almost seem so. Forget the way the people speak and the absence of big modern office and apartment buildings and the existence of the average Londoner is very much like that of the average New Yorker; or, for that matter, like the life of the American in any big town. The Londoner, like the American, is confronted every day by the following after-the-war results:

Scarcity of houses; highway robbery in restaurants; ever-increasing cost of food, shortage of sugar; demands of the subway and street car companies for higher rates of fare; grousches of the traveling public because of the rotten service, the dirty cars and the crowded conditions; wave of crimes in which murders, hold-ups and burglaries form the majority; impatience with the manner in which the police force copes with said crime wave; theaters taking advantage of people's desire for amusement by kiting up the prices; daily accounts of big strikes which are threatened, and laundries which do more destroying than cleaning of clothes.

Vanderbilt Town of Biltmore Sold

ASHEVILLE, N. C., March 19.—Sale of Biltmore, built nearly a quarter of a century ago by the late George W. Vanderbilt as a model town, was made known today. The purchasers are Dr. J. A. Sinclair of Asheville, George Stephens of Charlotte, N. C., and the Southern Railway Company. The amount paid for the town was not announced.

Ask City to Try Out 'Meat Saving Week'

Next week will be "meat saving week" in Indianapolis.

Under the plan citizens will be asked during that period to refrain from buying the most choice cuts of meats. They will be persuaded to take cuts of round steak and other meats at lower prices than those they have been accustomed to buying.

The week will be carried out in other cities of eastern and middle western states. It was designed by the department of justice with a view to bringing about a cut in the consumption of the choice cuts of meats and subsequently a reduction in price.

Stanley Wyckoff, fair price commissioner, is in charge of the plan here.

Falling Icicle Kills Little Girl in Street

NEW YORK, March 19.—Theresa Walsh, nine years old, was fatally injured when she was struck on the head by a heavy icicle which fell with a mass of snow from the roof of a three-story building on Bethune street, near Greenwich street, in front of which she was playing with a number of other children. When she did not rise from the street the other children became frightened and ran away.

Patrolman Patrick J. Meade of the Charles street police station, found the child lying in the street and summoned an ambulance from St. Vincent's hospital, where she was removed with a fractured skull. She died an hour later without regaining consciousness.

Raid 'Soup and Fish,' 'Sky' Limit Game

NEW YORK, March 19.—The police raided a gambling house on Seventy-fourth street, arrested three men in evening clothes and seized gambling apparatus and a stock of liquor. The police say the stakes were as high as \$30,000 a night. Not more than a dozen players were admitted to the house at a time, they say.

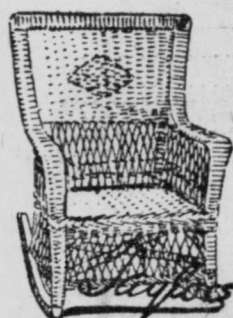

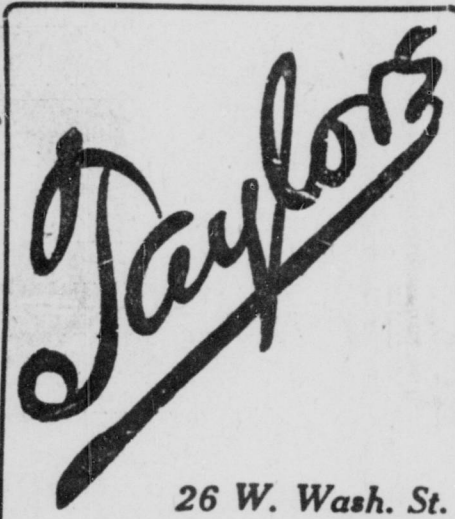

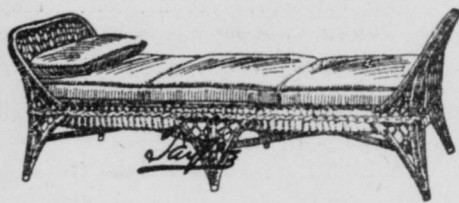

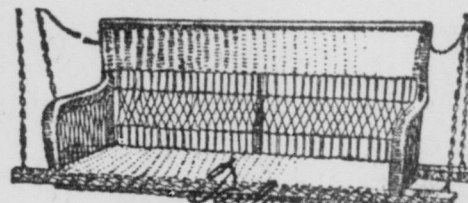
