Republicans in Many Contests for Precinct Jobs.

Charles M. Clark, bookkeeper, employed in the county treasurer's office, has filed notice of his candidacy for nomination for state representative on the republican ticket.

Many candidates are filing for the position of precinct committeeman, but the contests for this party job are practically confined to the republicans.

Few democrats have filed so far.

## Ratification or Not, Women Will Vote

Irrespective of the ratification of the federal suffrage amendment, there are 17,500,000 women over voting age who live in states that have already qualified women to vote in the presidential elections in November, according to statistics recently gathered.

Ratification will extend the privilege to about 9,500,000 more.

The states where women will vote for the next president include the fifteen full suffrage states:

Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Michigan, Nevada, New York, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, Wyoming; the thirteen presidential, or presidential plus municipal, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Maine, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Wisconsin, Ohio, Kentucky; the two primary suffrage states, Arkansas and Texas.

The total number of electoral votes in the choosing of which women will have a voice is 330, or nearly two-thirds of the total number of electoral votes.

## Sir Oliver Lodge Tells of Talks He Himself Has Had With Dead

Indianapolis intellectual circles teemed today with talk about Sir Oliver Lodge, British scientist and spiritist, and revelations set forth in his lecture at Caleb Mills hall last night.

Early today calls began to arrive at the Indianapolis public library for Sir Oliver's book, "Raymond, or the Life After Death."

Communication with spirits through persons gifted with mediumistic powers is possible, Sir Oliver Lodge affirmed.

He related many personal experiences in conversation with the dead in support of his stand.

"Death," he said, "is a separation of the soul and body."

"The personality, individuality, character and self remain extant with the soul and retain memory."

"The body is only the instrumentality through which the soul manifests itself. Its ability to manifest itself in ways we can understand."

"It is not wonderful that the mind can get along without the body."

"The wonder is how the mind ever became associated with matter."

Sir Oliver said he first became interested in actual psychical experimentation in the case of Mrs. Piper, of Boston, in 1889.

She was recommended as a medium to the English Society for Psychical Research by Dr. William James of Harvard.

For twenty-five years the society investigated her case to determine if she received any material assistance in her work and if her communications were telepathically obtained from the living or the dead.

"You must grant us the existence of telepathic powers of communication or we can not go far in such a discussion," he said.

"It is the simplest phenomenon encountered in psychical study."

For many years, the lecturer said, difficulty was experienced in establishing the fact that mediums were actually un-

der spirit control because of the plausibility of the explanation that they got the information for messages from minds of the living.

He then related a conversation, by medium, held with a deceased "Uncle Jerry," who told him of certain marks inside Uncle Jerry's old watch, which he himself had never seen.

Investigation disclosed that Uncle Jerry was right.

A forceful aunt of Sir Oliver, long dead, conversed with him in characteristic manner.

Sir Oliver defined telepathy as the production of mental impulses apart from materialistic instruments.

A great many people can transmit such impulses, he said, but only a few can receive them.

The gift is not generally enjoyed and all thoughts are not conveyed telepathically, he added.

If they were the art "would be a great nuisance."

The impression conveyed in telepathy is pictorial; hence phantasms of the dying, so often perceived by persons at a distance, are probably actual visions.

**MRS. PIPER TELLS OF "LOVELY PLACE."**

Deceases were placed on the trail of the gifted Mrs. Piper for years, to discover if she gained her information from libraries, cemeteries or other repositories of information.

Her control was a masculine voice, a friendly old man, who acted as a scribe or transmitter for other spirits.

Mrs. Piper always returned to consciousness from a trance in an exalted state and said she retained the impression of having been in a lovely place.

Sir Oliver said he believed the soul

risks in the ether on separation from the body at death and that continuity of consciousness is not interrupted at all by the process.

Philosophers down through the ages have believed that the mind was only temporarily associated with matter, he said.

The story of Socrates, who answered inquiries of his friends before drinking the hemlock by saying: "Bury me where you will, but I will not be there," was recalled to show that this Greek philosopher knew of the life after death without any teaching by Hebrew prophets.

"Writers of epitaphs, who write 'Here lies the body, etc.,' in all probability are themselves lying," Sir Oliver said.

## Prince Stops in California April 7

WASHINGTON, March 24.—The prince of Wales will be in San Diego, Cal., on April 7, it was learned here today. This will be the only stop of the English prince in the United States on his way to Australia.

He will stop at Honolulu after leaving California.

The vessel upon which the prince is sailing, it is said, will pass through the Panama canal.

## Dean Hart Dies

DENVER, March 24.—Dean H. Martyn Hart, rector of St. John's Episcopal cathedral here for forty years and a widely known churchman, died here today.

Dean Hart was 82 and was born in England.

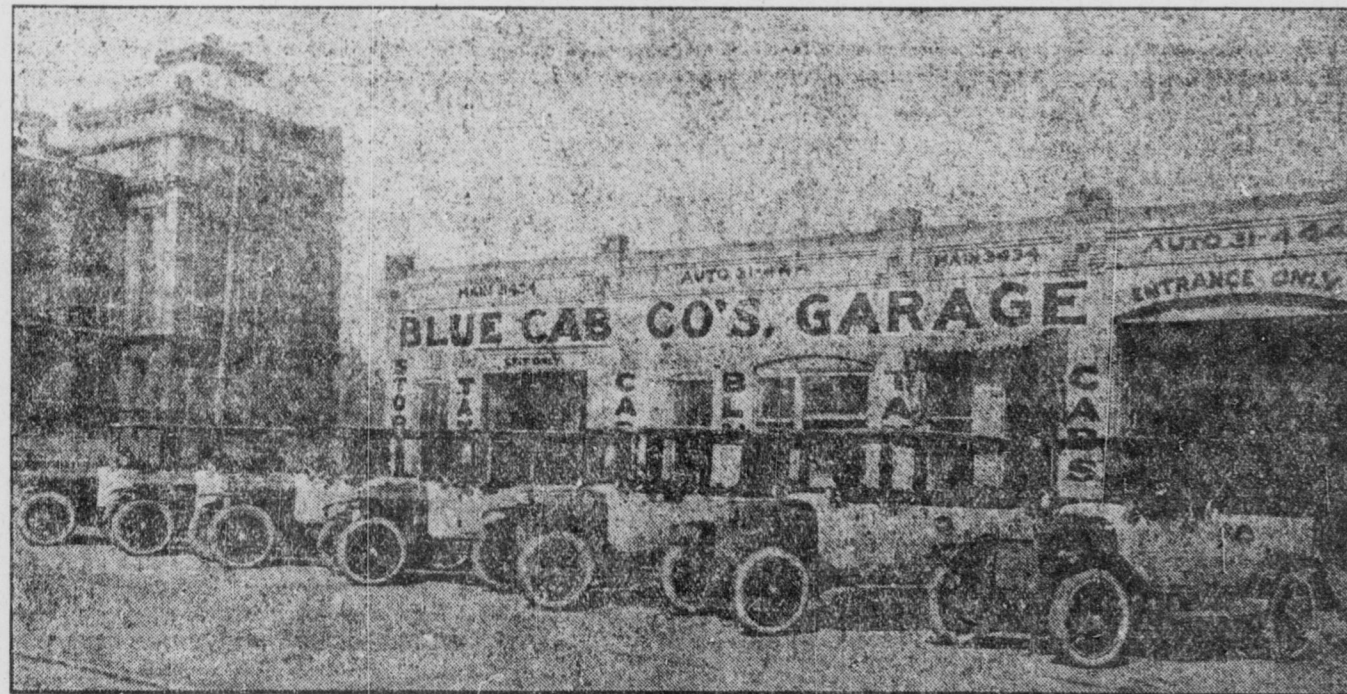
