

## RETURN MY SON! P'LL GIVE \$25,000'

Father Scorns Sum Asked  
When Boy Is Kidnaped.

LEXINGTON, Ky., March 25.—A statewide search is being conducted by the police for Paul Little, 12-year-old son of E. R. Little, Kentucky capitalist, who was kidnaped from in front of the government building yesterday within view of the late afternoon spring crowds, and his 14-year-old brother.

A note was delivered at his home demanding a ransom, supposed to be \$25,000, and protection for the kidnaper. Threats were made if these two provisions were not complied with.

The elder Little is quoted as telling the police he did not care about the \$25,000, if he could get his son back safely.

The kidnaper went to the home while Paul was playing with boys of the neighborhood and promised him a dollar if he would deliver a box of candy.

The two went away together and were followed at a distance to the government building by Paul's playmates.

While the boys stood at a window on the first floor of the building the kidnaper and the boy disappeared, probably in an automobile.
