As vice president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association she was closely associated with Dr. Anna Howard Shaw and Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt in furthering the suffrage cause.

Recently there was formed the National League of Woman Voters, with headquarters in the Munsey building.
