

COUNTY G. O. P. CHAIRMAN HAS REAL DILEMMA

Anti-Jewett Men Insist Hendrickson Give Them Place on Primary Board.

Harry Hendrickson, republican chairman of Marion county, is facing a dilemma.

The "anti-Jewett republicans" are demanding representation on the primary election board, which he will appoint. If he names "anti-Jewett" men on these boards he will throw away the advantages the old organization has in the control of the primaries from the time the polls open until the returns are finally compiled and announced to the public that generally believes they represent an honest count of the votes actually cast.

If he does not name "anti-Jewett" representatives on the board the organization will be in a position to conduct the primaries as very much pleased.

But the "anti-Jewett" men will not abide by the results of the count announced by the organization boards as being the real sentiment of the voters of Marion county.

SOMETHING MISSING IN HAYS' "HARMONY."

In other words the "harmony" that Will Hays says exists in all parts of the republican party has not yet developed that part where any one faction is willing to entrust the ballot boxes and the poll sheets to the tender mercies of the other.

Of course the "anti-Jewett" crowd does not believe the organization would miscount the votes.

They just barely assert that past experiences have proved to them that unless they have a reliable man in each precinct the results will not be a true reflection of the sentiment of the people of Marion county.

They are not calling any names or making any faces—yet.

But they do not hesitate to tell Mr. Hendrickson that they represent a great big faction of the republican party, a faction that controls about 12,000 votes and they intend to vote those votes in the primary election.

And in order that there may be no dispute as to whether they are counted, they want representation on the election board.

Further, they say unless they have representations on the election board and their representatives are satisfied with a fair deal they will delegate sufficient of their votes to vote the democratic ticket to make it futile for the organization to hope to elect its candidates in the coming election.

THE "ANTIS" KNOW FROM EXPERIENCE.

The "antis" know their experience in this respect in the election that made Charles W. Jewett mayor.

They have charged ever since that the office was stolen from Jewett and they say this contest will be the first starts the stolen will not get an office if they can prevent it.

Hence, in order that they can be present to see that no one starts stealing, they demand places on the election board.

And they say refusal of these places will be prima facie evidence that the organization has no right to do at the polls that it does not want everybody to know about.

The complication is complex.

Certain interests that are behind a certain much talked of candidate for presidential honors are past grand masters in making the primaries show what they want the primaries to show.

These interests have worked through the organization and they do not care for "antis," especially not on the election boards.

Mr. Hendrickson will listen to them and ignore the "antis" remains to be seen.

It is very evident that if he expects the county of Marion to contain a united republican party after May 1, he will give the "antis" what they want.

policy of evicting persons who make complaints to us.

"Letters have been brought to us by tenants showing that they had been ordered to move for no stated reason at all.

"In some cases the reason obviously is that the tenant has been complaining about the landlord."

"The District of Columbia rental law became effective last October and has been successful in its operation."

"To persons who protest that a law tending to limit return on property would discourage building and improvement I can only point to the Washington law, which has not had that effect in any degree."

Mr. Wyckoff recently returned from Washington, where he discussed the rental situation with several of the justice officials and other observers, all of whom advocated the use of the rental commission plan throughout the country, he said.

The District of Columbia law gives three rental commissioners power to fix rents, prohibits eviction of tenants while a case is pending, gives the commission jurisdiction over service charges, such as telephone, light, heat and elevator in connection with occupancy or rental of any property, and permits an appeal to the court of appeals.

In Indianapolis and throughout Indiana the sublease practice is resulting in speculation and artificial inflation of rental values, according to Mr. Wyckoff.

"Practices of some property owners and rental agents here are very vicious," said Mr. Wyckoff, "and tenants in many parts of the city are becoming dangerously aroused."

"A group of tenants in the western part of the city have banded together to repel eviction by force, if necessary."

STREET CURBS TO BE CLEARED

Board of Works Orders Removal of Approaches.

The board of works today ordered all timber and makeshift curbing approaches to the hauling wagons and automobiles from the street to the sidewalks, removed by April 8.

The board announced that all such approaches will be torn up by employees of the department after that date and that the board of safety would be asked to order arrests for all violations of an ordinance governing such obstructions in the future.

The board today awarded the following contracts for street improvements:

Ruckle street, from Forty-second street to Park avenue, bituminous concrete, awarded to J. N. Morgan & Sons on a bid of \$3,392.97.

Hampton drive, from Illinois street to Boulevard place, bituminous concrete, awarded to Mansfield Engineering Company on a bid of \$25,002.15.

First alley east of Capitol avenue, from New York street to the first alley north, two-course concrete, awarded to the Columbia Construction Company on a bid of \$12,150.

First alley east of New York street, from Capitol avenue to Muskingum street, two-course concrete, awarded to the Columbia Construction Company on a bid of \$16,312.

An interesting race for the nomination for prosecuting attorney also is developing with five possible candidates in the field.

Clay Batchelder is the only one of these who has filed his declaration.

Two other soldier candidates are in the race—Edward P. Brennan and Albert Stump.

Russell J. Ryan of the firm of Ryan, Ruckelshaus & Ryan, and Jacob L. Steinmetz are the other possible candidates for the office.

Five candidates are being mentioned for the nomination for circuit judge, the only judgeship to be elected.

Edgar A. Sprague is the only candidate who has filed this far.

The others who are either actively seeking the nomination or have been mentioned as possible candidates are Robert I. Marsh, Joseph B. Williams, Paul G. Davis and Woodburn Massot.

No candidate for treasurer has yet filed his declaration, but at least four are being mentioned as possibilities.

They are Cortez D. Blue, formerly engaged in fruit growing in Washington township; John F. Barrett, a coal dealer; William K. Sprague, publisher of the National City bank, and Wallace W. Mains, treasurer of Hurst & Co.

George Harden and Charles C. Morgan are mentioned as possible candidates for county commissioner representing the third district.

Don Herr of Wilcox & Herr, proprietors of the Yellow Cab Line, is mentioned as a candidate for commissioner representing the third district.

Three candidates for coroner are in the field. They are Dr. Augustus L. Marshall, Dr. Frank T. Dowe and Hayden Buchanan, the latter an undertaker.

Candidates for the legislature are not so active at this time, as candidates for county offices, but it is expected that many of the county's quota will file before the time limit. Several candidates representing organized labor will make the race, it is reported.

CHICAGO'S MAIL HANDLED HERE

The Indianapolis postoffice is being swamped with Chicago mail, and many complaints have been made by postal authorities concerning extra work necessitated by the distribution of mail from Chicago to points in Illinois, it was said today.

Robert H. Springsteen, postmaster, said today several hundred sacks of mail are being received here daily from the Chicago postoffice, which, he said, was in a badly congested condition, due to a lack of space, labor shortage and the expressman's strike in that city.

It is said that in the mail sacks being received here catalogs for last year's trade have been discovered, as well as special delivery letters and parcel post packages.

A regular terminal is maintained here for the distribution of Illinois mail from eastern points, according to Mr. Springsteen, but recently hundreds of sacks have been sent from points north and west for Illinois postoffices, including mail sent from Chicago.
