

REVOLT AIMS AT CARRANZA

Move in Sonora for Secession
Called First Step.

AGUA PRIETA, Mex., April 1.—Preparations for armed hostilities against the Carranza government are rapidly being made throughout the state of Sonora, which threatens secession from the Mexican republic, and observers here regard these as the beginning of a general revolution against Carranza, according to information obtained here today.

Under orders from Gen. De la Huerta of Sonora and Gen. P. Elias Calles, an armed force is being mobilized along the Sonora-Sinaloa state line to repel a threatened invasion of Carranza troops, said to number 5,000.

At the same time 2,500 men have been dispatched as reinforcements for the Sonora troops by "Pancho" Villa, who, in a message sent to Gen. Calles today, saluted the latter as a "comrade in arms" and announced hostilities against "that traitor Carranza."

The most drastic of the laws limit rent increases to 25 per cent a year.

Provisions also include that a landlord's willful failure to provide necessary light, water, heat and power constitutes a misdemeanor.

Muncie Judge Raps Grand Jury's Failure

MUNCIE, Ind., April 1.—Indignation prevails among law-abiding citizens of Muncie today following the failure of the Delaware county grand jury to take any action against open defiance of the law in this city.

Judge W. A. Thompson severely scolded members of the jury and Prosecutor Clarence E. Benadum late yesterday when the jury failed to return certain indictments.

He said there are three open gambling houses within a stone's throw of the courthouse and that bootleggers are working in defiance of the law.

In his report the jury praised the manner in which Benadum is conducting the prosecutor's office.

CHICAGO, April 1.—"You look just like Violet," a man told Mrs. William Olson when he tried to enter her home here.

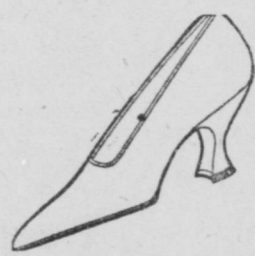
Mrs. Olson blossomed out with her husband's revolver and chased the flower-lover from the house.

Chamber's Freight Bureau Stops Leaks

This represents an increase of more than \$100 in the saving of this department alone over the month of February, when the savings to members made by checking their freight bills against the proper charges as prepared by the freight and traffic division resulted in a saving of \$904.15.

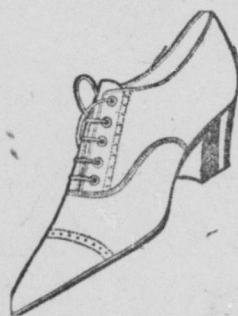
