

SLAYER SERVE LIFE

Indianapolis Negro Guilty of
Second Degree Murder.

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., April 1.—Upshaw "Boy" Northington, Indianapolis negro, will spend the rest of his days in prison for the murder of Sergt. Wade Hull of the Indianapolis police department.

He was found guilty of second degree murder by a Shelby county jury, which reported at 10:30 o'clock last night.

Sergt. Hull was fatally wounded when he led a raiding squad into a negro gambling den in Indianapolis last fall.

Judge Alonzo G. Blair said he would sentence him to life today.

"When the verdict was read Northington laughed heartily."

"So long Bill," he mused as he received the news of his fate.

In the closing arguments Cloris Adams, Marion county prosecutor, drew fire from counsel for Northington, when he made a word picture of the crime.

Adams compared the slaying of Hull that of Sergt. Maurice Murphy.

Funeral Services Held for J. L. Carr

Rev. W. O. Fifer officiated at the funeral services this afternoon for James L. Carr, 51, a prominent citizen of Indianapolis, who died at his home, 1925 North New Jersey street, yesterday.

Mr. Carr came to Indianapolis from Pennsylvania in 1879 and had for years been a collector of antiques and an authority on early Indiana history, his father having been Col. John Carr, who built one of the first blockhouses and served in the Hoosier state for protection against Indians in the tribal.

Mr. Carr retired a few years ago after having been engaged in the drug business at Nineteenth and Alabama streets for twenty-seven years.

He is survived by the widow, one son, Arthur B. Carr, of Indianapolis, one brother, John S. Carr, and a sister, Mrs. Anna Lewman, both of Memphis, Ind.
