Men's Bible classes of Marion county will rally tomorrow.

There will include a parade through the downtown streets tomorrow afternoon, followed by a mass meeting at the First Baptist church.

Dr. James S. McGaw, who has talked in many states, will address the mass meeting.

His subject will be "Men's Bible Classes and Their Relation to Christian Citizenship."

It will be the thirteenth annual rally of the men's classes of the county.

The parade will form on the Circle at 1:45, ready to march at 2:15.

The line of march will be west on Market street to Illinois street, south to Washington street, west on Pennsylvania, north to Vermont and west to the church at Meridian and Vermont streets.

The Brookside Park U. B. church band will head the parade.

The class having the largest number of men in line will be given a banner, and the class having the largest per cent of its attendance for the last twelve weeks will be given a banner.

MERIDIAN HEIGHTS CHURCH FLOURISHING

The annual report of the Meridian Heights Presbyterian church, Forty-seventh street and Park avenue, shows the church to be in a flourishing condition.

The church closed its fiscal year, in which the budget was \$39,198.88, with a bank balance of \$308,900.

The budget for the ensuing year of \$35,000 already has been accounted for.

Additional amounts were raised for benevolences and other purposes.

The congregation shows an increase in membership for the year of seventy-one, and the Bible class enrollment of 300 is an increase of 20 per cent over last year.

DEFIES ORDER TO BACK FESLER

Fred Davidson, Out for Assembly, Appeals to Voters.

The fourth municipal concert under the auspices of the departments of public schools and public parks was given by the Indianapolis Matinee Musicale in Caleb Mills hall last evening.

The attendance was evidence that Indianapolis is appreciating the concert series.

This program was arranged by Mrs. Frank Edenthaler and was planned with skill and interest.

The opening number was "Introduction and Allegro" (Godard) for piano and orchestra, played by Miss Mary Jeanette Lilly, with second piano accompaniment by Miss Ruth Elizabeth Murphy.

Marion Louis sang at the Marion hall last Tuesday night, called apparently in the interest of all concerned. I refused to sign a resolution endorsing Mr. Fesler for governor, that I feel disposed to make my position public.

"I wish to state that my reason for not signing the resolution of the candidates for representative in this country was not on account of any special opposition to Mr. Fesler's candidacy, but because the principle indicated by calling the candidates together and then impressing the voters with the fact that they must join their local political destinies with those of a candidate for a state office, did not concur with my ideas of personal ethics."

"My own service taught me that no organization could be successful in any undertaking unless every man was imbued with the principle of standing fairly and squarely on his feet in a fight for the interest of all concerned, and for the ideals that reason told him would be the benefit of every man connected with the organization."

"I have this matter in the hands of the republians of Marion county, who, by their votes on primary day, will indicate whether or not a man to be nominated for a public office shall bow to the will of a few, representing a single interest, or stand fairly for those ideals which will guarantee to all citizens fair treatment in the administration of the affairs of state."

TONER ALSO IN PROTEST

Edward C. Toner of Anderson, candidate for the republican nomination for governor, who has almost religiously defended the Goodrich tax law, is angered because the Goodrich-Jewett men of Marion county are trying to throat the other candidates than Mr. Fesler.

A statement issued by him declared that he would not stand on one foot "to stifle the free expression of popular government."

COAST FREIGHT TRAFFIC AT STOP

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10.—With freight traffic practically paralyzed on the Pacific coast today, through the strike of yardmen and switchmen extending from Portland to Los Angeles, railroad heads and brotherhood officials today made a desperate stand against the "insurgents."

It was estimated that 2,500 men are out.

Plants in and around Pittsburgh have been experiencing a shortage of fuel for several weeks and only a few days' supply is on hand.

Five men have been given only small relief.
