William P. Jungclaus to Erect

\$412,400 School Building.

A contract for the building of an addition to the Enmerich Manual Training High school has been awarded by the city school board to the William P. Jungclaus Company on a bid of \$412,400.

The building will be of brick and steel fireproof construction, facing Merrill and Union streets, and measuring 90 by 194 feet.

It will contain an auditorium, lunch room, gymnasium and locker room, being connected with the main building by an overhead bridge.

Under present plans the Manual Training High school will be improved to accommodate 2,000 students.

The heating and plumbing contract for the addition was awarded to Frey Bros. on a bid of \$61,382.96, the wiring contract to the Hatfield Electric Company on a bid of \$5,600, and a contract for the installation of an elevator to the D. V. Reedy Elevator Company.
