

NIBLACK PRIMARY BALLOT SUIT UP

court Hears Arguments on First and Second Choice.

Judge Louis Ewbank of the circuit court this morning heard arguments on the petition of Mason J. Niblack, a democratic candidate for the nomination for governor, for the granting of a mandatory order compelling the state election commissioners to give the primary ballots gistered first and second choice for voter at the primaries May 4.

Counsel for Niblack filed an additional paragraph of complaint, alleging that the 1917 act is unconstitutional because it attempts to revise the law of 1915 without setting out the law in full, as is required by section 10 of the constitution. George James P. Goodrich, William H. Thompson and William Spencer, as election commissioners; James Fesler, Wm. T. McCrary, Edward C. Toner, John Enzinger, Carleton B. McCuloch and James Kirby Risk, all candidates for governor, are defendants to the suit brought by Niblack.

CITY FOR CAR FARE CHANGE

The next higher fare is not instituted. Thus if the present 5-cent fare is not sufficient to maintain the \$150,000 surplus and for three months the next higher rate is 6 cents, with a 1-cent transfer, shall be instituted.

If this fare should not prove sufficient to maintain the required surplus then the next higher fare, which is a 6-cent fare with ten tickets for 55 cents, shall be decreed by the commission.

The highest fare provided is a 6-cent fare with a 1-cent charge for transfers.

TERM AT CLEVELAND

END OF REDUCTIONS.

It shall be the duty of the city street railway commission to watch the city's interests and see that the reductions in fare are made when the financial status of the company justifies it.

The cost of service, on which the rate of reduction will be based under the proposed order, will include all operating expenses, all taxes, interest on \$6,000,000 valuation of the company, the salary of the street railway commissioners and "other proper expenditures."

Any amount remaining in the surplus and when the emergency order is terminated, shall be applied to improvements. The new fare shall continue until the next fare is reached and the surplus is maintained for three months.

The city takes the stand that a utility could not receive the same return on investment during an emergency as during normal times.

In other words, it declares the street company should bear a portion of the burden of the present high prices.

RANCHINE CALLS

FOR 5-CENT FARE.

The street car company's franchise with the city of Indianapolis provides for a rate of 5 cents, or 6 tickets for a quarter.

On Oct. 12, 1918, the public service commission made the fare a straight 5-cent.

On Jan. 6, 1919, the commission ordered a fare to continue "over a period covering the signing of the treaty ending the world war, and of its ratification by a country, and one hundred days thereafter." The said order is therefore annulled or changed by order of commission.

The city contested the right of the public service commission to increase the fare over that provided in the city franchise, which had not been surrendered.

The supreme court upheld the commission.
