TWO Indiana celebrities will grace the local stage within the next seven days.

Miss Ruth Page, daughter of Dr. Lafayette Page of this city, will appear Sunday night at the Murat in a concert with the Adolph Bolm ballet and the Little Symphony orchestra.

Miss Marjorie E. Edwards, daughter of Edward F. Galligan of Terre Haute, will sing the role of Helen in "See-Saw," the Henry W. Savage musical play coming to English's next Thursday night.

Elsie Janis and her gang opens at English's Monday night, while the curtain at the Murat will ring up on "Shubert Galettes of 1919" for a week's engagement.

Stella Mayhew will be the big name at B. F. Keith's next week.

THE BOLM BALLET.

Miss Ruth Page will be given a wonderful reception Sunday night at the Murat during the concert of the Adolph Bolm ballet and the Little Symphony orchestra.

Indianapolis is prepared to turn out in large numbers to welcome Miss Page on her first appearance in her home town following her triumphant tour of South America and her success in Chicago and New York.

Between fourteen and sixteen different ballets will be presented here at the Sunday night concert.
