

SWEET TOOTH HOISTING PRICE OF SUGAR HERE

Abnormal Demand Shown by
America's Gluttony and
Neglect of Market.

SPECULATOR IN GAME

America is paying dearly for her "sweet tooth."

And she is making the rest of the world pay for it, too.

This is one of the things found out by a reporter who went on the trail of the truth about the sugar situation.

He also found men who ought to know about the sugar business—who declared that speculators had taken advantage of the situation and forced the price to an abnormal basis.

Another reason, so the reporter was told, is that Great Britain entered into competition with America in buying Cuban sugar, and took quite a big slice of it to the British Isles for afternoon teas and other uses.

EXPERT ASSIGNS CAUSE OF PRICES.

One man, who is classed as an authority on sugar, said that the high price of sugar is due first to the abnormal increase in the demand for sweets; second, to the railroad strike, which held up shipments, and third, to speculators.

America failed to get into the opening buying in Cuba until a late date for this year's crop, according to sugar dealers.

The general opinion in the sugar trade was that an open market with competition, following the end of government control, would force down the price of sugar.

SPECULATORS GET FINGERS IN PIE.

But speculators got their fingers in the pie in Cuba. Speculators dug in to grab the crop, and to keep referees going, they began to refine sugar for speculators—at about 3 cents a pound.

In January sugar was wholesaling in New York at 12½ cents a pound and dropped to 9½ cents a pound in February. A month later, sugar was looked for in the Cuban market.

Today the price of raw sugar is 18½ to 20 cents, it is asserted.

PER CAPITA USE SHOWS INCREASE.

In 1915 the consumption of sugar per capita was eighty-four pounds.

In 1916 it was ninety-two pounds. With only 4,100,000 tons available for 1920, against a demand for consumption of 5,000,000 tons a shortage of 240,000 tons appears, officials say.

With a growing demand for candles, soft drinks and all products, and with a world market for sugar, many sugar dealers predict that sugar will stay at a high price for three years at least.

SUGAR IN CHICAGO 'TO BE 33 CENTS'

CHICAGO, April 22.—Sugar prices soared to new high levels here today.

Wholesale grocers today were notified by sugar refiners that the best price they can be quoted is 29½ cents per pound.

This means sugar at 33 cents a pound to the consumer, wholesalers say.

"It is all due to an overestimation of the Cuban production," said B. L. Thomas, sugar buyer for the largest wholesale grocer in the west.

"The Cuban planters estimated four and half million tons, but there are only three million tons."

"Unless some step is taken by the government to curtail its sale, the situation will be serious."

"I believe eventually that the government will have to ration sugar."

Thomas declared his firm's last purchases cost slightly over 18 cents a pound.

Today's quotations show a jump of 11 cents a pound since then.

CALLS ON WHITE PEOPLE TO HELP

Colored Attorney Asks Moral
Support Against Lynchings.

Pleading for moral support of the white people to avoid lynchings in Indiana and the nation, W. E. Henderson, an Indianapolis attorney, delivered the chief address today before the delegates of the first Indiana convention of colored people at Bethel A. M. E. church.

Mr. Henderson's subject was "Anti-Lynch Laws."

Resolutions on the present race situation in Indianapolis will probably be adopted by the convention late tonight, supporting resolutions adopted last night condemning crimes committed against women and children and urging expeditious execution of the law against the offenders.

George P. Stewart of Indianapolis presided at the meetings today.
