AMATEUR PARADE PLANS.
Every team in the Indianapolis Amateur baseball association will turn out Sunday and take part in the big parade scheduled to precede the opening games of the Saturday afternoon season.

The parade starts at 1:45 p. m., forming at Michigan and Meridian streets, moving south on Meridian to Vermont, east on Vermont to Pennsylvania, south on Pennsylvania to Washington and west on Washington to Senate avenue. Mounted police will be at the head of the procession, followed by city officials, I. A. B. A. officials and the band.

The complete parade schedule follows:

Head of Line—Michigan and Meridian. Section A—On Meridian, north to Michigan; mounted police, city officials, I. A. B. A. officials, band.

Section B—On North street, east side of Meridian, facing Meridian; City League.

Section C—On North street, west side of Meridian, facing Meridian; Motor League.

Section D—On Meridian, Walnut to North (head of section), at North extending west on Walnut; Manufacturers League.

Section E—On Meridian and St. Clair to Walnut, extending west of Meridian on St. Clair; Commercial League.

Section F—On St. Clair, east side of Meridian, facing Meridian; Sunday School League.

Section G—On Meridian, Pratt to St. Clair, head of column, at St. Clair; Indiana League.

Section H—On Pratt, east side of Meridian, facing Meridian; Municipal League.

All officers, managers, umpires and scorers in the Motor League will meet at the Spalding sporting goods store tonight. Don't be a draw-back.
