

ARMORED TANKS RUSHED BY U. S. TO NEW MEXICO

Troops to March Parallel to
Movements of Mexicans,
Says Gen. Dickman.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 29.—Six armored tanks, carrying machine guns, were ordered sent today from El Paso to Columbus, N. M., and Nogales, Ariz., by Maj. Gen. Joseph T. Dickman, commander of the southern department.

Each of these towns, which are on the border between the United States and Sonora, will get three tanks.

Reports from revolutionary sources indicate there is a likelihood of fighting between revolutionists and federalists near both Nogales and Columbus.

United States troops will march parallel to the movements of either Mexican, federal or revolutionary troops near the border, Gen. Dickman said today.

All Mexican troop movements are being closely watched.

Gen. Dickman said, however, there was no immediate danger from the revolution to property or lives on this side of the border.

Thirty thousand American troops, he declared, are stationed along the international line prepared for any crisis.

Neither the Seventh or Eighth cavalry, stationed at El Paso, will be ordered into Mexico, he said.

SACRAMENTO REACHES PORT OF TAMICO

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The U. S. cruiser Sacramento has reached Tampico and is prepared to offer protection to Americans there in the event of the revolution endangering them, according to information to the state department today, through official channels.

Looting has been reported in Alvarado, south of Vera Cruz, where federal troops and rebels continue to fight and much banditry is reported in the vicinity of Vera Cruz.

Bandits are also reported active near Guadalupe, having attacked the power plant there.

Railroad and telegraph communication between Juarez and Chihuahua City has been cut off.

Trains leaving Juarez have had to return by the lines held by the rebels.

Six hundred federal troops have arrived at Vera Cruz.

The navy department today received a report that the U. S. S. McClellan arrived at Topolobampo and the U. S. S. Salem arrived at Mazatlan on April 27.

No report was made on conditions by the commanders of the vessels.

Don Carlos Green, governor of the Mexican state of Tabasco, has declared in favor of the Sonora revolution, according to dispatches reaching the Sonora agency here today.

Green, who is the descendant of an American, has been in revolt against the Carranza government for some time, but had not previously indicated the Sonora revolution.

Pay-as-You-Leave Car Called Success Here

A new combination pay-as-you-enter or pay-as-you-leave street car, placed in service for the first time on the Pennsylvania line, proved successful, according to James P. Trotter, superintendent of the Street Railway Company.

NEGRO CAPTURED IN 2-MILE CHASE

Charged With Drawing Knife
on Street Car Conductor.

Scores of citizens, some armed, took part in a wild chase at noon today with police and detectives after a negro who is alleged to have tried to stab a Brightwood street car conductor.

The negro, who was captured by a clever ruse of Sgt. Sandman, gave his name as Orsby Barnhill, 21, of 3906 East Twenty-sixth street.

About a dozen shots were fired by the police.

According to Ted Sarber, 1118 Calhoun street, conductor, and Mark Hombes, 1017 Massachusetts avenue, notorman, Barnhill became obnoxious in the car soon after he boarded it down town.

It is said he was ordered not to open a window because it was too cold for other passengers.

At Twenty-sixth street and Brightwood avenue Barnhill is said to have pulled a knife from his pocket and slashed at Sarber, who was assisting a woman and two children off the car.

The negro ran and the emergency was called.

Several persons with shotguns joined the chase for more than two miles through alleys, business streets, over fences until Thirty-fourth street, northeast of Brightwood, was reached.

Here the negro had just darted through a thicket and was about to board a motor truck driven by William M. Baker, 1324 Cappel street, when Sgt. Sandman stepped from the truck, pointing a pistol.

Sandman, who carries considerable avoirdupois, had fallen behind in the race and when the truck came by commandeered it.
