

**DEEP DEATH VIGIL
OVER RAY IN CELL****Negro Says He Did Not Mean
to Kill Martha Huff.**

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., April 29.—William Ray, Indianapolis negro, is quietly awaiting Aug. 5, when he will die in the electric chair.

A death watch is being kept over the cell chamber in which Ray is the only prisoner at present.

He will be in a few days by Walter Baker, recently sentenced to death for the killing of Carl Cook, a Laporte grocer.

It is possible that Warden Fogarty will ask the governor for permission to have a double execution.

Callers at Ray's cell are restricted to the chaplain and the warden.

Three shifts of "watchers" keep a constant vigil over the condemned man's chamber.

The negro was put through the usual routine when he arrived here at 1 o'clock yesterday.

First, he was given a bath, then sent to the barber shop and later to the Bertillon room.

His only words were that he did not mean to kill Martha Huff.

It is stated Ladd and Miss French met on a golf links and that their friendship developed while playing that game.

The bride's gift is a laurel leaf platinum pin, containing five diamonds of great size and brilliancy.

Other gifts include a diamond wrist watch, diamond necklace, a pearl necklace and a galaxy of smaller jeweled ornaments.

Confinement cases used to be \$25, now cost, for confinement of first baby, \$50; second baby, \$40; third baby, \$30; twins, \$60, and \$50 to be the cheapest charge per baby.
