FOR WATER FETE

Carnival on River Will Be Centennial Feature.

More than 500 persons will participate in a water pageant to be staged on White river at Riverside park on Wednesday night, June 9, as part of the general centennial celebration in Indianapolis when the city observes its 100th anniversary.

Water craft of all descriptions will be seen in the pageant, from canoes and replicas of steamboats and flatboats to miniature hydroplanes. All of the craft will be beautifully decorated and illuminated with various kinds of lanterns.

Wallace O. Lee, chairman of the water pageant committee, announced that cash prizes totaling \$500 will be awarded for the most attractive boats.

The prizes will be given as follows: First, \$100; second, \$50; third, \$30; fourth, \$25; fifth, \$20; sixth, \$15; seventh, \$10, and eighth, \$5.

All canoe owners, owners of rowboats and launches in Indianapolis are urged to enter the pageant.

Those persons intending to enter will be asked to register their names at the office of the canoe club.

Further plans for the pageant will be discussed at a meeting to be held Thursday night at the Riverside Canoe club.

Sinn Feiner's Death


