

INDIANA PLAN FOR REDS URGED

Push Americanism, Is Plea of State Commerce Body.

The "Indiana plan" for combating radicalism, as devised by the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce, is being presented by the state chamber to civic and commercial organizations of the state with the suggestion that they take the initiative in developing the idea in their respective localities.

In a communication sent out by the state chamber the plan is summarized as follows:

"1. Americanism is the principal objective sought. (This means constituted authority upheld and class consciousness suppressed.)

"2. Own your home is the chief incentive. (The home is the foundation of the republic—the more homes and the more home-owners, the more stable will be the government. Home-owning stabilizes social and industrial conditions and creates a better type of labor. Your home is a part of your community, which is a part of your government.)

"3. Thrift is the medium of accomplishment. (The present price of building material may keep you from building a home now; but at a time when you are getting the best wages of your life you can save a little each week with which to buy or build a home later. Every dollar thus saved is a step toward a home of your own. Thrift develops character and efficiency. Start saving now.)

"4. Stabilized citizenship, which is but another name for true Americanism, is the result of the practical operation of the 'Indiana plan' with its 'great trinity' of Americanism, thrift and home-owning."

The "Indiana plan" has the endorsement of some of the leading business men of Indiana and in other states.

A number of local commercial organizations in Indiana are now adopting it. Every local commercial or civic organization is urged to take up the plan with the state chamber in developing the plan in every locality at the earliest possible moment.

The state chamber will render every possible assistance to these organizations or committees of representative business men, in developing the plan in their respective communities.
