## KILLED BY CIRCULAR SAW

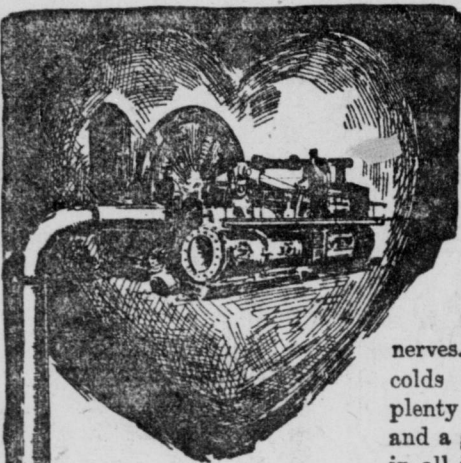
BRISTOW, Okla., May 28.—Sharpening a circular saw on an emery wheel
