

## CONGRESS NOT DECIDED ON ADJOURNMENT

Mondell Resolution Provides for Quitting Capital on June 5.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Congress will quit Washington for the political conventions after five more working days if hopes of its leaders are carried out. Representatives Mondell, house republican leader, has introduced a resolution for adjournment June 5.

Senate leaders are against an adjournment and favor a recess of a month or six weeks.

According to present indications approach bills and a few minor conference reports are likely to be the only business transacted during the five remaining days.

**BONUS BILL UP TO SENATE.**

The bonus bill carrying \$1,400,000,000 benefits for soldiers and practically a like amount in new taxes which was passed by the house Saturday will probably receive early action in the senate.

The bonus bill will be reported to the senate this week. If it should be brought up before the convention it could be kept from passing by a filibuster which many senators would be willing to conduct.

**WILSON MAY TAKE HAND.**

Members would not be surprised to have President Wilson ask congress to stay in session to act on high cost of living measures which he has recommended. Fear of some such action on the part of the president is one reason senate leaders favor a recess rather than an adjournment.

Another reason for senate adjournment is the demand of the senate progressive group for regulation at this session on the packer regulation bill and other cost of living measures. The packer regulation bill is to be taken up directly after the recess.

## TRAIN CRUSHES AUTO, KILLING 2 AT CROSSING

Machine Catches Fire and Victims Burn in Crash Near Valparaiso.

**5 LOSE LIVES IN OHIO**

VALPARAISO, Ind., May 31.—Two more victims were added to the list of those killed at Mou's crossing when Dr. John Borowik and Mrs. Gus Benzik, 38, both of Chicago, met death there last night.

The two had spent the day at Flint lake with a picnic party.

Returning they were in the last automobile of five which had made the trip. The other four machines had crossed

the Pennsylvania and Nickel Plate tracks which run parallel at this point.

Dr. Borowik waited for one train to pass and then started across the tracks, driving in the path of a westbound passenger train.

When the other members of the party heard the crash and returned to the scene, the Borowik machine was on fire.

The bodies were burned beyond recognition and it was necessary to poll the group to learn who was missing.

**INTERURBAN KILLS FIVE NEAR AKRON**

AKRON, O., May 31.—Five persons were killed when an interurban car struck an automobile at Springfield Center, about three miles from here, early today.

The dead are:

Miss Eva Rafferty, 18; Albert Rafferty, 18; Sylvester Rafferty, 22, and Elmer Rafferty, all of Gramplan, Pa., and Miss Lucinda Marcus, 19, of Akron, O.

Miss Catherine Rafferty, also of Gramplan, the sixth passenger in the automobile, was injured so severely that she may die.

The engine of the machine went dead on the tracks, it was said.

**9 KILLED, 20 HMRT AS TRAINS CRASH**

WILMINGTON, Del., May 31.—Nineteen passengers were killed, three seriously, and twenty injured in a wreck of Pennsylvania and Nickel Plate trains near White Oak, Okla., shortly after midnight, according to a long-distance telephone message received from Vinitia, Okla., early today.

Five of the dead, according to word here were identified as:

Harry Dunham, engineer, Ft. Scott, Kas.

Jim Randall, engineer, Monett, Mo.

Burns, mail clerk, Kansas City, Mo.

News agent, name undetermined, Oklahoma City.

Albert Martin, negro, Oklahoma City.

Four, unidentified, were said to be two white men and two negro women.


