

ATORS FOOL NE, SAYS SPAAN

Large Crowd Hears Talk on Peace Treaty.

DANVILLE, Ind., June 14.—"The efforts of the senatorial cabal over a year to Americanize the treaty of peace was simply a political ploy and will fool nobody except the man who desires to be fooled," declared Henry M. Spaan of Indianapolis, democratic candidate for congress from the Seventh district, before the Central Normal College club here Saturday night.
A crowded hall heard Mr. Spaan present the 1920 campaign issues and denounce the senatorial leaders for their parangung and failure to ratify the Paris peace treaty.
"The Chicago convention, in the adoption of its platform on the league of nations, has finally disclosed where the leaders of the senate have really stood, and stand now," said Mr. Spaan.
"It discloses the fact that their pretense of Americanizing the league was simply for political purposes.
"There are many republicans who are really in favor of the league of nations, but the senatorial cabal betrayed them and sold them out for the sole sake of party harmony.
"The league of nations document appeals to the honest and moral sense of the American people, and is for the purpose of establishing the same measure of morality between nations that exist as to individuals."
Mr. Spaan declared that it is just as wrong for a nation to rob and murder as it is for an individual, and stated that the league of nations does away with all this.
"It is the first great effort in the history of the world that has been made to bring about an agreement among the nations to prevent war, and the republican party will be held to an account-

ing by the American people for refusing to join in this great modern measure," he declared.

"This league does away with the evasions and the chicanery of international politics as heretofore practiced."

"It wipes out all secret understandings which heretofore have been such fruitful causes of war."

"The pretense that the league takes away from congress the right to declare war, is false."

"The pretense that it gives England more power in voting at the council table; that it interferes with our domestic questions, such as tariff and emigration, is false."

"In fact, the whole tissue of objections that were included in the Lodge reservations were false, and were put forth for the sole purpose of misleading the American people, and the action of the republican leaders at Chicago shows that this is true, because they have abandoned the league entirely, reservations and all."

The objections of the senatorial cabal to the league of nations was based upon two propositions: One, hatred of Wilson, and the other the desire to make political capital, the speaker declared.

He said that it is now up to the American people to determine whether or not

they will raise themselves on the side of morality and better government, or whether they will be in favor of this political bantling, born at Chicago, which the republican leaders have put in the place of the great covenant of peace.
"The questions involved in this league of nations are moral questions, and upon moral questions the American people are always right."
Mr. Spaan contended that the future safety of Ireland and Germany will rest with the league of nations.
He said that under the great covenant, established by this league, any nation that feels itself aggrieved may present these grievances to the league council, and it will be published to the world.
"It will then remain for the nation which does the wrong to face the organized public condemnation of the civilized world."

"That is what the great covenant is," he declared.

"It is the organization of the best public opinion of the world."

Detective Foran Shot by Robber

Detectives today are searching for the freight car robber who shot Patrick F. Foran, railroad detective and former patrolman, 883 Meikel street, Sunday night.

Foran is at the City hospital with a bullet in his leg.

He discovered a man robbing a freight car at Twenty-third street and the railroad tracks.

The man failed to obey Foran's order to halt and opened fire, Foran returning the fire.

In the exchange of shots the railroad detective was wounded and the thief escaped.

The man who shot Foran is a white man.

The shooting occurred near the place where Railroad Detective Lee Stringer was murdered by negro car robbers about a year ago.

Action on resolutions for sidewalks on Forty-ninth street from Pennsylvania street to Central avenue, and on Forty-ninth street from Central avenue to College avenue, was withheld until a hearing may be had.

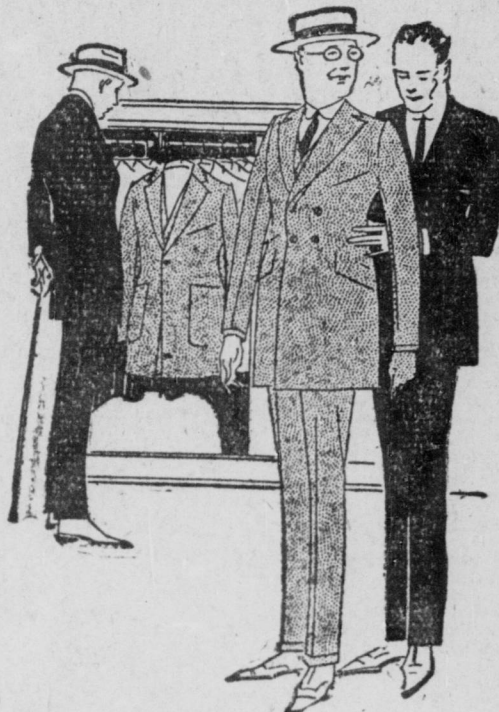
Discount Rumor of Lenine-Trotsky Fall

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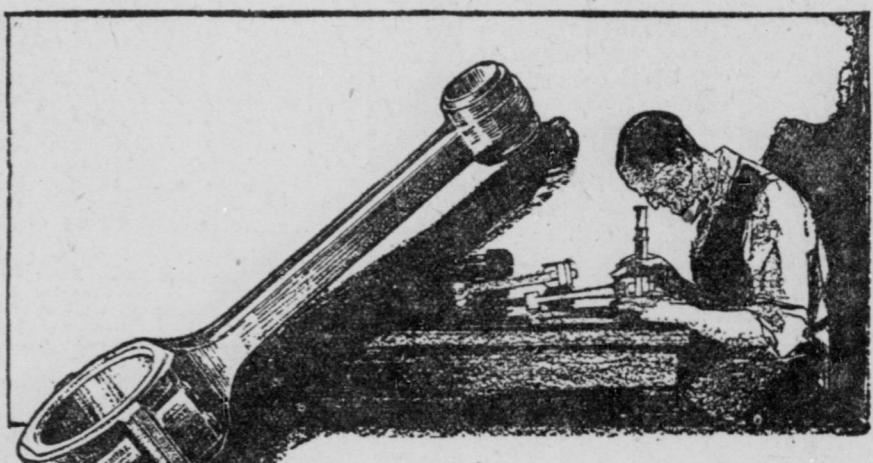
