

BOOSTING PLAN COMPLETED FOR INDIANAPOLIS

Chamber of Commerce All Set for 'Selling' Hoosier Capital to World.

FRED MILLIS IN CHARGE

J. B. Reynolds, general secretary of the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce, announced today that the general program for making Indianapolis the best appreciated city in America, which was formulated by the convention board of the Indianapolis Advertising club, has been taken over by the chamber.

Fred Millis, as director of promotion for the chamber, will be in general charge of the program.

Mr. Millis was executive secretary of the convention board which represented the advertising club in entertaining the recent world's advertising convention in this city.

Charles F. Coffin, president of the Chamber of Commerce, was one of the most enthusiastic supporters of that program and in conference with other officers of the chamber, before he left to attend the International Chamber of Commerce meeting in Paris, he expressed the desire that the spirit of community cooperation which had been intensified through the efforts of the convention board, might be enlisted in a continued and enlarged campaign for the advancement of Indianapolis.

JUNIOR CHAMBER PART OF PROGRAM.

The plan for the creation of a junior chamber of commerce, advanced by Mr. Reynolds, and approved by the board of directors yesterday, is a part of the enlarged program and the organization of this department will be one of the first duties assigned to Mr. Millis.

It is expected at least 1,000 of the younger business men will be enrolled and that by engendering in them the spirit of service to the community, undeveloped resources for the advancement of Indianapolis will be cultivated.

"I have been observing closely the work that Mr. Millis has done for the convention board," said Mr. Reynolds, "and I feel that we are fortunate in being able to interest him in continuing in public service."

"It is our thought that ultimately we will develop what may be termed a 'sales department' for the city of Indianapolis with Mr. Millis as the general sales manager, and with a staff of men engaged in 'selling' Indianapolis to the rest of the world."

GET INDIANAPOLIS READY FOR 'SELLING.'

"In the meantime we must complete the work the convention board has so well started—that of getting Indianapolis ready to be 'sold.'"

"The co-ordination of many city activities, the improvement of some of our local conditions, the education of our own citizens as to the natural advantages of Indianapolis, the development of Indianapolis as the center of distribution, these and many other activities are open to us and we purpose to use the present

awakened civic spirit resulting from the coming of the advertising convention to keep the wheels of progress moving."

Mr. Millis was with the Indianapolis News for four years as assistant advertising manager.

He is a native of Indiana, having been reared at Crawfordsville.

He was graduated from Hanover college and later taught school for one year at Noblesville.

He then became a reporter on the Indianapolis Star, later business manager of the Terre Haute Spectator and advertising manager of the Houston, Tex. Chronicle before coming to Indianapolis.

KIRBY RISK SUED BY JACOB P. DUNN

LAFAYETTE, Ind., June 18.—As an echo to the bitter fight waged by James Kirby Risk against members of the democratic party while he was a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, a suit has been filed here by Jacob P. Dunn, formerly city controller of Indianapolis, asking \$30,000 damages as a result of statements he charges Risk made during his campaign.

The complaint alleges that the defendant falsely and maliciously accused the plaintiff of criminal acts.

He charges that Risk made the statement that "even Joe Bell couldn't keep him in his administration" and that in a speech before the Woman's Franchise league at the Claypool hotel in April, Risk accused him of issuing \$19,000 worth of fraudulent checks, some of them for persons who did not exist.

The complaint alleges that Risk distorted a report of the state board of accounts so as to give a wrong impression of Dunn's actions.

The plaintiff quotes the report of the state board of accounts and points to the fact that charges against him were dismissed.

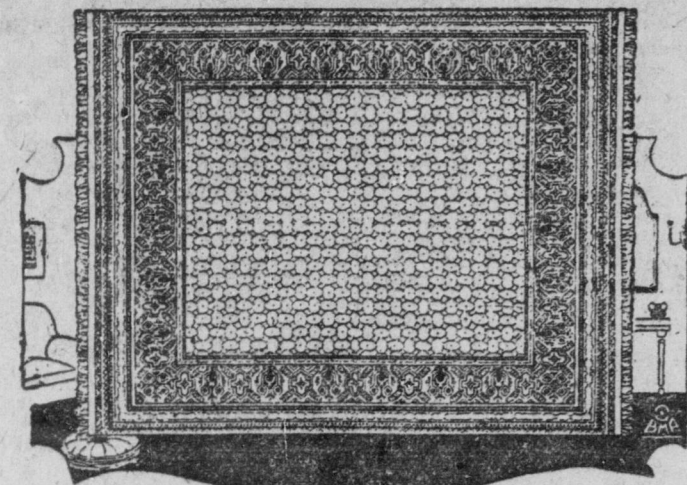

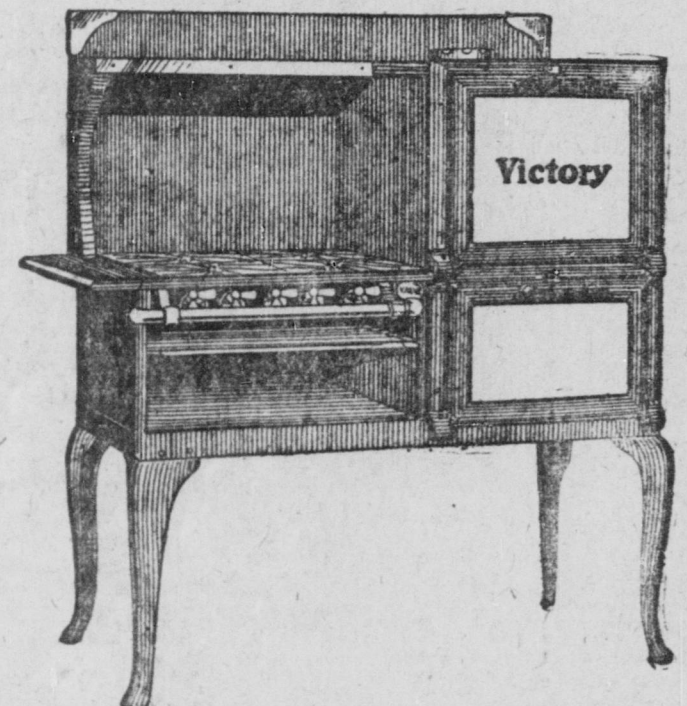

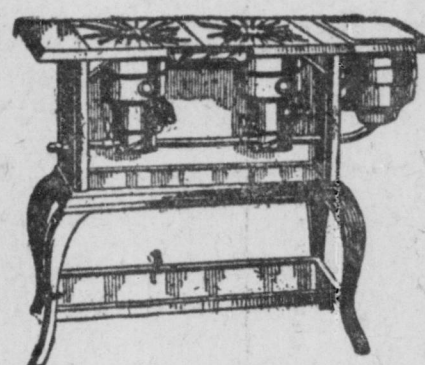
