CLOSE MARMON SALES MEETING

Burlesque Spelling 'Bee' on Last Day.

The last day's session of the Marmon salesmen's convention was held today at the plant, the main feature of the work consisting of a variation on an old-fashioned "spell-down."

The questions to be asked are on the mechanical construction of the Marmon 34, and are based on the hand-book recently published by the company and on catalogs and other technical literature of the company.

Sides will be chosen; the last man on each side to stand will be receive a kit bag, and a prize of \$50.

If he succeeds in selling a sufficient prospect, the winner of these funds will receive an additional sum of \$100, while the distributor who sent the winners will get silver trophy cups.

There were more than one hundred and fifty at the banquet tendered the visiting salesmen in the Riley room of the Claypool last night.

It was practically a speechless dinner, although a few brief talks were made.

Civil War Veteran's Funeral Tomorrow

Funeral services for Samuel L. Houser, 88, a Civil war veteran, who died at his home, 3540 College avenue, will be held at the home tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Burial will be at Crown Hill cemetery.

Mr. Houser, who was born at Hamilton, O., in 1834, served three years in the Thirty-fifth Ohio Volunteer Infantry in the Civil war.

He was promoted to captain for bravery in action.

Mr. Houser was conductor in charge of the first train arriving in Indianapolis over the Springfield division of the Big Four.

He was a member of the George H. Thomas Post of the G. A. R., and the Order of Railway Conductors.

He survived his widow, a daughter, Mrs. Robert Marshall of Sherman, Tex., and a stepdaughter, Miss Olive Allison of Indianapolis.

Engineers to Present Bill for Civic Center

A resolution to be presented at the special session of the legislature asking the establishment of a civic center by the vacation of three blocks bounded by Walnut, Vermont and Pennsylvania streets has been adopted by the Indianapolis chapter of the American Association of Engineers.

TARIFF NEVER BENEFITS LABOR'

Minister Says Immigration Bars Must Be Kept Up.

Manufacturing and commercial interests must not be permitted to beat down the immigration bars, declared Rev. Charles H. Winders, executive secretary of the Indianapolis Church federation, in an address to the Bible Investigation club at the Y. M. C. A. auditorium last night.

He spoke on the subject, "Shall We Bar the Immigrant?"

"Commercial interests today are maintaining agents abroad in the war-torn countries of Europe and Asia, urging cheap labor to come to our shores, and back here they are fighting high standards of immigration in order to reduce manufacturing costs," asserted Dr. Winders.

"And in this connection, I want to say that protective tariff benefits only the manufacturer and never labor, and we must not permit ourselves to think for one moment that high wages have brought about high prices, for doubled wages are never responsible for doubled prices, no never."

"At no time has the immigration question loomed so large in our national horizon with the close of the war and a return to normal conditions, but we are convinced that for the good of American institutions we must raise the standards of immigration laws," Dr. Winders said.

A light was seen in the home of Robert Hume, 3540 North Capitol avenue, at a time when the family was away from home.


Neighbors called the police, but the thief left the house before the emergency squad arrived, and nothing was stolen.


