EIGHT TRAINING  
AT GREAT LAKESHigh School Boys Taking Sea-  
men's Course.Eight Indianapolis high school boys  
are included in the list of 107 lads who  
today began a six weeks' training course  
and outline at the Great Lakes naval  
training station, Great Lakes, Ill.The list of local boys includes T. F.  
and C. F. Buckels, 235 North Meridian  
street; W. H. Gaddis, 200 Newland  
avenue; J. P. Lighter, 3720 East New  
York street; A. C. Muhler, 221 Talbot  
avenue; L. W. Morgan, 549 Parker  
avenue; P. J. Carr, 522 West Ferchill street,  
and W. L. Parker, 837 Dearborn street.The naval department has decided to  
recruit another list of 100 high school  
boys for a second training course at  
the Great Lakes station.Lloyd Lighter explained that the lads do  
not obligate themselves to join the navy  
by taking the training course, but he  
said it was a splendid opportunity for  
the boys to learn what the navy did for  
the young man of the country.Each boy is provided free with uni-  
forms, sustenance, and is paid \$33 a  
month during the course and is given  
the regular training for apprentice sea-  
men.Applicants have been required to pass  
the usual physical examination and pay  
their fare to Chicago, the navy, how-  
ever, paying the return trip fare.Kipp Funeral to  
Be Held TomorrowFuneral services for Albrecht Kipp, 71,  
president of Kipp Brothers Company,  
27-39 South Meridian street, who died  
yesterday at his home, 1240 Broadway,  
will be held tomorrow at the chapel of  
Planner & Buchanan, funeral directors.Mr. Kipp was born in Germany in  
1849, coming to the United States in  
1867.He was employed for a short time in  
a grocery on South Illinois street and  
later entered the employ of Charles May-  
er.In 1880 Mr. Kipp and his brother,  
Robert Kipp, established a similar busi-  
ness.Mr. Kipp was known as an expert in  
business affairs and was active in civic  
movements.He was one of the active organizers  
of the German home, now the Athenaeum.Mr. Kipp is survived by the widow and  
two children, Albrecht Kipp of Rappa-  
port & Kipp, attorneys, and Miss Frieda  
Kipp.Greensburg Y. M. C. A.  
Founder Dead at 88Greensburg, Ind., July 15.—Funeral  
services were held here today for Nelson  
Mowrey, 88, philanthropist and founder  
of the Greensburg Y. M. C. A., who died  
at his home here of heart disease.Mr. Mowrey was a man used from hum-  
ble surroundings and for many years was  
the support of a widowed mother.He had acquired a large fortune and  
became the largest land owner in Decatur  
county, possessing in the year 1900 more  
than 3,000 acres, which he later dis-  
posed of.Among his extensive gifts to various  
institutions he celebrated his eighty-  
second birthday anniversary by giving \$12,  
000 to establish the Y. M. C. A. here.One year ago he added \$25,000 to the  
endowment fund of the institution.Mr. Mowrey was a republican and had  
been a Mason for sixty years.Farmer Arrested in  
Auto Theft CasesGilmore Reynolds, 22, a farmer living  
near Osgood, is under arrest charged with
