

**GOV. COX GOES TO MEET WILSON****President Shows Keen Interest in Conference.**

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Gov. James M. Cox, democratic nominee for president, will arrive in Washington at 1:20 Saturday afternoon for his conference with President Wilson at the whitehouse Sunday.

The candidate will be accompanied by George White of Oklahoma, one of his campaign managers, and will be the guest while here of Judge Timothy A. T. Ansberry.

Judge Ansberry has long been one of Gov. Cox's most enthusiastic supporters and an member of the District of Columbia delegation at San Francisco, had the honor of placing Franklin D. Roosevelt in nomination as the governor's running mate.

Judge Ansberry said no detailed plans had been made for Gov. Cox's reception. He will remain quietly at the Ansberry home until the time of his conference with President Wilson, but it is expected the Ansberry residence will be besieged by prominent party leaders wish-






