G. A. R. Encampment Committee Plans for Decorations.

In addition to the decorations on homes, special decorations will be used at all meeting places and in the downtown district.

The American flag will be used in all of the decorating schemes.

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., July 29.—Boundary lines between Canada and Alaska north of Prince Rupert are being determined accurately by engineers of the Dominion and American governments.

A party of Canadian engineers from Ottawa has begun survey work here and are working north to meet a party of American engineers who are working south from Yukon river.

The two expeditions will clear a boundary trail cut fifteen years ago and erect new culms and monuments to mark the dividing line between the two countries.

The work of defining the boundary clearly is due to the silver strike in the coast mountains.

The silver fields lie on both sides of the line and in the present state of the boundary miners are unable to tell whether they dig their claims are located.

This is an important question between the nations, as the silver mines promise rich development.

Since the beginning of summer miners have been flocking into the region and Prince Rupert has done a bonanza business as an outfitting point.

The mineral output will be sent here for shipment east over the Grand Trunk-Pacific, the only railroad in this part of the country.
