

AND STATE FAIR WILL SHOW ALL ABOUT BABIES

Sixty Infants in Glass House
to Be Examined
Daily.

SIX BANDS ARE ENGAGED

Hundreds of persons who attend the Indiana state fair to be held Sept. 6 to 11 will show great interest in the hog and cattle show.

Others will exhibit great interest in the automobile show, when they will show father the kind of car they want him to buy.

Still others will pass most of their time about the race track "whoopin' 'em up" for their favorite horse.

But unless the guesses of most of the officials of the fair are wholly out of line, there is one attraction that is expected to make more noise and excite greater interest than all the other attractions put together.

That is the better babies show, that is a new feature in the Indiana fair.

Officials estimate that about 800 infants will participate in the show.

They say it is not going to be a contest of the best looking babies.

Not at all.

OBJECT OF BABY SHOW.

The object of the show will be to give each youngster thorough physical examination, to chart its perfections and defects, and to give information as to what baby needs in the way of foods, and to instruct the mothers as to the best methods to rear their little ones.

But regardless of all this, many persons will attend baby shows and disregard the pretty babies altogether, and pay attention wholly to the future political possibilities of the nation's potential managers.

The show is to be conducted in a large glass enclosure, while Mr. Vox Pop stands outside and looks on.

About sixty babies, clothed only in Mother Nature's raiment, will be examined each day, and the most perfect babies will be assembled on a platform in the coliseum and the prize awards made.

Other attractions, in addition to the baby show, are to be offered at the 1920 fair, all of which will help to make it the biggest and best ever.

Officials announced that the swine show this year is to eclipse those of former fairs.

It is estimated that between 1,800 to 2,000 head of hogs will be entered this year.

BOYS AND GIRLS' PIG CLUBS.

Boys' and girls' pig clubs, it is expected, will enter more than 300 pigs in the swine exhibit.

Music is to be no small feature of the 1920 fair.

Six concert bands will play and their programs will be one of the chief features of the exposition.

The boys comprising the Indiana Boys' School band, from Plainfield, will play Sept. 8.

They will make the trip from the school in a truck.

The Indianapolis Automobile Trades association expects more than 100 makes of pleasure cars and trucks to be entered in the auto show which will be held in the manufacturers' building.

Four of 1921 model will be shown in the Indiana show months before they are exhibited at any other place in the country.

The display of motor accessories also will be held in the same building.

About thirty members of the Indianapolis club will exhibit nearly all-makes of tractors at the fair.

The horse show will be held in a large section of the grounds south of the horse barn.

HOSPITAL RIGHT ON GROUND.

The Robert Long hospital of Indianapolis, with a staff of surgeons and trained nurses, will conduct a first aid tent, where service will be dispensed free of charge to the public.
