

**ADE TO BE HOST  
TO G. O. P. LEADERS**Humorist Sets Next Tuesday  
for State Powwow.

Men and women members of the republican state committee, state candidates and republican editors of Indiana and men and women heads of county organizations have been invited by George Ade, Hoosier humorist, to an all-day conference and organization meeting at Hazelden farm, near Brook, next Tuesday.

Lawrence Loring, chairman of the Tenth district, is co-operating with Mr. Ade in arranging the affair.

It is expected more than 100 persons will attend the gathering.

Aside from the furthering of organization plans, and perfection of the registration drive for a big registration of republican voters Sept. 4, the chief attraction at the event is to be a fried chicken dinner.

Former United States Senator Albert J. Beveridge, who is to take the stump for the republican national ticket, speaking in Chicago Sept. 17, expressed confidence yesterday that the republican party will sweep the country in November.

In connection with the plan of Senator New, who is at the head of the national speakers' bureau, each of the nine state committees in the state will hold Constitution day meetings Sept. 17.

**AFTER SHARES  
ON \$200,000,000****Hoosier Heirs Plan to Get Control of Estate.**Special to The Times.  
MARIAN, Ind., Aug. 27.—One hundred and twenty-five residents of Grant county are said to be heirs to the \$200,000,000 Coate-Coppock estate of Pennsylvania, legal steps to obtain control of which are to be instituted soon in Philadelphia.

The property in question is located in Venango, in western and northern Philadelphia counties, Pa., and in the city of Philadelphia.

It is said to have been leased by Marmaduke Coate on July 16, 1816, to various persons.

The lease was at an annual rental of \$1 an acre and was for a term of ninety-nine years.

At the end of this period the title to the property was to revert to the heirs of the original owner.

The date of this reversion would be July 16, 1916.

Two hundred and fifty of these descendants and heirs live in Ohio and Pennsylvania.

It is said that at the time the lease was made there was no means for a proper record to be made.

The owner, Marmaduke Coate, was a member of the Friends church.

It is reported to presume, they say, that the lease was recorded in some church document.

**TO OFFER COURT TRADITION.**

There is a tradition among them that such a lease was executed, and this

tradition is to be brought forward in the title suit to be tried in the courts of Pennsylvania by Judge E. C. Abbott of Santa Fe, N. M., and Washington, D. C., who has been retained by the Coate-Coppock heirs to establish their rights to the estate.

In presenting his case Judge Abbott will use many letters, written at various times during the last 100 years, which refer to the Coate estate.

Descriptions of the property taken from letters and church documents are said to be of no avail at the present time in locating the Coate land.

Records in the land office at Washington

refer to the property in Venango county as "north of Oil creek to White mountain," that in Westchester county as "between the Brandys and the road to Old Dalton" and "Old Dalton to York road, Hickory lane to Ridge road."

Hickory road in Philadelphia was first

changed to Coate street—which name is

regarded significant—then to Fairmount

avenue. Old York road has been changed

to Fourth street and Ridge road to Wis-

sahickon.

It locates the property in a rectangu-

lar tract in the vicinity of Market and

Broad streets in the city of Philadelphia,

thirty-six blocks of the most valuable

property in the city.
