He is a native of Ireland, and has lived in this country since 1884.

## Daddy Volstead Put Off His State Ticket

ST. PAUL, Sept. 13.—Representative Andrew Volstead, father of the prohibition law bearing that name, was ruled off the Minnesota republican ticket for re-election Saturday by the state supreme court.

The court reversed the decision brought by Volstead against Rep. O. J. Kvale, winner of the primary election, in which the lower court held that Kvale had violated the corrupt practices act and declared Volstead the nominee.
