

## WOMEN ORATORS ARE IN DEMAND

More Places Want Speakers Than Bureau Can Supply.

The Democratic Women's Speakers' Bureau is doing a rushing business, with twice as many places clamoring for speakers as there are feminine orators to fill the dates.

Enthusiastic Democrats get quite indignant when informed that all the women speakers are engaged and the nearest assembly is something like a couple of weeks away.

"But, we are going to have a meeting tomorrow," trilled a feminine voice over the wire from somewhere down State to Bert Hendren, of the speakers' bureau.

"No, I can't see how I can do anything, we are worked to death with speaking engagements, can't you get a local speaker?" he asked.

"No, you just got to send somebody down here, because we have to have one," returned the Democrat with her grandmother's reasoning logic and a rising inflection of indignation.

"Well, listen here," said Mr. Hendren, "we absolutely haven't got a sign of a speaker in this vicinity, and all our women are doing twice as much as they should."

"Oh, very well, if you won't," returned the politician.

"It isn't won't, but—" but the speaker had been slammed down.

"That's the way it is all the time," sighed Mr. Hendren, "we just can't get enough women signed and calls for speakers are coming in all the time that we can't possibly fill."

Miss Landers will speak at Memon on the afternoon of Sept. 21.

Mrs. McCullough will make a tour on Sept. 28 and 29 of Marion, Blackford, Wells, and Adams counties with Thomas Taggart, Democratic candidate for United States Senator.

Mrs. Izetta Jewel Brown will speak at Rushville Sept. 27, at Richmond Sept. 28; Noblesville and Logansport on Sept. 29; and Indianapolis and Marion and night, Oct. 1 and Logansport Oct. 2.

Mrs. Borden Harriman of Washington, formerly chairman of the United States industrial board, and present national chairman of the League of Nations Club and the Cox-Roosevelt Club, will make a three-day engagement for Indiana early in October.

Mrs. Oliver Belden Lewis addresses a Cox-Roosevelt Club meeting at Evansville tonight.

This is the first meeting in southern Indiana conducted entirely by women.

## DEMOCRATIC POLL LISTS HELD UP?

Charge Auditor Fesler Fails to Complete Work.

Charges that Leo K. Fesler, Marion County auditor, is holding up the registration lists of the Democratic wards in the county from the Democratic County committee were made today.

The auditor, it is claimed, has withheld the lists of the Republican wards to the Republican committee, but says that he has not yet "checked up" the Democratic wards.

The registration law of Indiana requires that the county auditor must certify within ten days following registration day, the list of registrations in each ward to the county committee of each party.

This time expired Tuesday, and Mr. Fesler states that he has not yet completed the work of certification to the Democratic committee.

It is claimed that the registration lists for Wards 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 in Indianapolis, and for Perry, Franklin and Lawrence townships, all Democratic wards, are being held up by Auditor Fesler.

It is necessary for the county committee to have the registration lists, in order that they may check up the registration with the poll books, so that all Democratic voters may not register Sept. 20.

Republican workers have their lists and are working now along the same line contemplated by the Democrats, but the work of the latter is necessarily retarded by the failure of Auditor Fesler.

**BOARD TAKES 'EM UP ON 'BELIEF'**

Displaying what the board termed excellent civic spirit, a delegation of property owners living in Madison avenue between Lincoln and Hay street today asked the board of public works what kind of material will be used in resurfacing that highway.

The delegation came convinced that asphalt should be laid over the present asphalt, but said that President George L. Johnson offered a long time ago to lay a top layer of asphalt which would sustain the tremendous use which Madison avenue, as one of the main arteries into the center of the city, will receive as a complete resurfacing with asphalt they expressed their approval of the latter form.

Several citizens said they believed better prices might be obtained next spring, whenupon the board said it would wait until next spring to start a contractor on the work.
