

OFFICERS NAMED FOR LENOX CLUB

Improvement Organization Shows Results of Effort.

F. C. Jordan, secretary of the Indianapolis Water Company, in a speech to the members of the Lenox Improvement Club, at the meeting held at Twenty-Sixth and La Salle streets last night, told of the extensions and improvements the water company had made in the northeast section of the city during the last year.

New officers of the Lenox Club elected at the meeting are: S. C. Winkler, president; C. L. Fisher, vice-president; S. C. Winkler, secretary, and Miss Jessie Kemp, assistant secretary.

The object of the Lenox Club is to obtain improvements in the northeast section of the city.

"We have just completed the construction of a booster pumping station on Rural street, two blocks north of Roosevelt avenue," Mr. Jordan said.

The water company is now installing two six-million-gallon capacity centrifugal pumps with the necessary controls and fittings, and under the present plan the work will be completed before the end of the year.

The company has completed the installation of pipe on Winter avenue, north of Bloyd avenue, and we have laid 900 feet of pipe in Cooper avenue; and water pipe has been installed on Thirtieth street, two blocks north of Roosevelt avenue.

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Mr. Jordan told of other work now under way and explained how the Indianapolis Water Company co-operated with the city fire department to give protection against fire.

He said the cost of material used in the installation of water lines had advanced until they cost more than three times what they did before the war.
