City Court on Oct. 17, 1918, and on Oct.

"On July 14, 1920, he was paid \$50 of the \$500 which he collected for the State, and his last official act was to file with the court a written affidavit for this money, which you will find written in the entry docket of the Circuit Court in the two cases, numbered 32114 and 32115.

"If he can muster sufficient strength to sign his name to the present book in the office of the county clerk ordering an execution on these judgments directed to the sheriff, he will be liable for the sum of the sheriff to levy on these judgments, and if necessary to sell the real estate against which they constitute a valid, collectible lien.

"This is the way to collect these judgments.

"This is the way to get the money for the public, and it takes no more effort on the part of the prosecuting attorney to do this than it took to receive the docket for his fees of \$50 in these cases.

"The Republican prosecuting attorney is chargeable with the knowledge of these facts, and he is chargeable with the knowledge of the law.

SUPPOSED TO KNOW

LACK OF AUTHORITY.

"He is supposed to know that he has no authority to compromise these judgments, and that no one has this authority except the Governor of Indiana, but if he doesn't know it, I am telling him now, and that is the reason that I have given him the specific section and article of our constitution, the specific section of our statutes and the citation to the decision of our Supreme Court, which declares that he has no such authority.

"If he doesn't know that these judgments constitute a valid, collectible lien against the state, and the exact legal description of which I have stated previously, but with which I will be glad to furnish the Republican prosecutor, then I am telling him.

"The public may be willing to excuse this blunder, it may be willing to overlook the fact that he has unlawfully attempted to exempt a man convicted of a serious crime from the payment of \$1,500, but will it not excuse him for his failure to proceed to collect these judgments after it is pointed out that they unquestionably can be collected and that his attempted release and satisfaction of them is an absurdity.

"I now urgently call on him to order execution on these judgments and to collect the \$1,500 due on them.

The Republican candidate for prosecutor, in a public statement, said:

"The insinuation that some one in the prosecutor's office profited financially in this transaction, but why should the Republican candidate be so outraged at such a verdict in the Leppert case?"

"Leppert, it must be remembered, was sued on forfeited bonds which he gave for the defendants, Dave Crenshaw and Garrett Osborne, in two blind tiger cases.

"Leppert was convicted of operating a blind tiger in the City Court on Oct. 17, 1918, and on Oct. 21, 1918, and he was convicted of the same charge on appeal in the Marion Criminal Court on Dec. 18, 1918.

satisfaction is a nullity and the \$1,500 due on them constitutes a valid, collectible lien on very valuable pieces of Washington's great real estate?"


