Recreation Department Taking Steps to Put Game on Higher Plane Here.

MEETING NEXT WEEK

First steps toward organization of the 1920 Indianapolis Amateur Football League will be taken at a meeting to be held in the council chamber of the city hall Thursday evening at 8 p.m. The league will be composed of all amateur teams in Indianapolis coming under the 150-pound weight limit.

R. Walter Jarvis, director of recreation, said it may be that he is in receipt of several requests for organization of the league from managers of various teams in the city and prospects for a fast loan are bright.

The Finsiders cupped the championship of the league last season, defeating the Military eleven in the final game at Brookside Park. All games played at 100 were well-attended and witnessed by large crowds of amateur sport boosters.

Jarvis announced today that the champion of this year will be awarded a team trophy and each member of the team will be awarded a gold medal by the recreation department.

The recreation department is laying off football fields at each of the municipal parks, and within two weeks everything will be in shape for the accommoda-

tions of twenty-five leagues.

Police will be on hand to keep the crowd well out of the way of the players, police protection will be provided and the recreation department will secure efficient of-

ficials to conduct.

It is also planned to carry out last season's stunt of furnishing coaches for the various eleven in the association. Last year coaches from all schools and university stars were appointed by the recreation department to attend the practice drills of each team in the city.

The recreation department is working with the youngsters pointers on the finer points of the game. The work of these men brought about a big improvement in the play of the amateurs before the season closed.


Sadi After Yanks.
