## Grand Circuit Results

### TROT RECORDS GO.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 8.—World's records were broken at the Grand Circuit meeting here Thursday. The sensational 4-year-old trotting gelding, Peter Manning, in winning the \$5,000 Transylvania stake for 2:36 trotters, stopped the fastest mile ever trotted by a 4-year-old of his sex in a race, when he tramped the third heat in 2:02½; his three heats in 2:03, 2:02½ and 2:02½ are the three fastest heats ever trotted, and the three heats also constitute a new world's record for a trotting gelding.

The former race record for 4-year-old trotting geldings was 2:03½ and was set by Peter Manning at the North Randall meeting last August. Mabel Frank formerly held the record for three heats, regardless of sex, and the record for three heats by a trotting gelding was set here last year by Early Dreama.

Peter Manning was not the only sensational performer on the card Thursday afternoon. The little Cleveland gelding, Prince Loree, in an attempt to beat his pacing record of 2:02½, made at the Grand Circuit meeting at Syracuse, paced a mile in 2:00. Summaries:
