

COLVER WARNS WOMEN AGAINST G. O. P. PROGRAM

Former Trade Commission Man Makes Bitter Attack on Senator Watson.

WT. WAYNE, Ind., Oct. 8.—War with Mexico may follow Republican success and defeat of the League of Nations at the November election, William B. Colver, former chairman of the Federal trade commission, said last night to the State League of Women Voters here.

Colver said the mercenary interests which desire to exploit the natural resources of Mexico are fighting the League of Nations because it guarantees Mexico from such an invasion.

Colver's warning as to Mexico was hardly received as a bitter attack he made on Senator James E. Watson.

Reviewing a speech Watson made in the Senate in which he attacked the Federal trade commission, Colver showed how the speech came at the time the commission was investigating the five big meat packers.

Because he has never been able to make Watson support the vague charges he made against the commission, Colver said, he had "come to Indiana, Watson's home," to force the issue.

MAKES A STAND

Specifically and with intimations which pointed to a barrage should Watson repeat, Colver demanded to know who prepared the speech Watson made in the Senate, who supplied Watson with the "facts" upon which the speech was made, and who "framed the charges against the commission."

Colver also asked Watson to inform the people of Indiana who "hired Clarence Martin, an Indianapolis attorney," long before Watson's special committee hired him, and who paid all Martin's expenses before he became attached to the Senate party.

Colver also quoted Senator Kenyon, a Rep. from Indiana, whom Colver praised, to show how Watson had refused to follow up his sensational charges against the commission.

At the time Watson made his speech in which he charged that commission employees who had investigated the packers were Socialists and Bolsheviks, it was noted how the speech would serve the packers by undermining faith in the commission.

A former Indiana man, friend of Watson, was an agent for the packers, and often was in Watson's office.

Colver revealed a telegram in which one of the packers told their legislative agent to call upon Watson to obtain information as to a committee and its actions.

Watson was chosen though there were several other Senators on the committee.

WOMEN TOLD OF EXCESS PROFITS TAX.

Colver denounced the last Republican Congress for its failure to repeal the excess profits tax and advised the women to judge of the present promises of future action by the conduct of the last Congress.

He charged the excess profits tax with being in part the cause of the high cost of living.

"There has been at work in this country for years a cleverly masked propaganda, the real end of which is first a war and then the annexation of Mexico," Colver declared.

"A definite group of big interests in the country are behind Mexico."

"They are to be allowed to seize and exploit her natural resources."

"If we joined the League of Nations we would bind ourselves to refrain from wars of conquest."

"I doubt if the American business man, the worker and the farmer who cheerfully pays the cost of a war for the rights of others, cares to buy a war in defense of the ranches of somebody else."

Colver said he had now resigned from the Federal Trade Commission, that he was a private citizen, that Watson had instigated him to be a traitor and that he had awaited this opportunity to meet him face to face to demand a "white man's chance" and to again, as man to man, demand that Watson either support his charges or give the facts of them to the public complete and apologize for them.

Colver said no one was paying his expenses, that he had consulted with no one nor no political organization, and that he was speaking before the women and on their invitation.
