

MASSON BLOCKS FESLER EFFORT

Republican Extra Voting Machine Plan Thwarted.

The apparent efforts of Leo K. Fesler, county auditor, to place at least two voting machines in the large Republican precincts has been blocked by Woodburn Masson, Democratic member of the election board and the Indiana State Board of Election Commissioners, it was learned today.

When Mr. Masson insisted that the two Republican members of the county election board agree to place at least one voting machine in each precinct, the State election commissioners were appealed to and the opinion of Mr. Masson was sustained by the State board.

Mr. Fesler wanted to take out two voting machines and I knew that if this was done the machines would be placed in the large colored voting precincts," said Mr. Masson.

Mr. Masson stated that he insisted from the first that the county election commissioners place at least one voting machine in each precinct, first, because it was mandatory by the statutes, and secondly it was a matter of equity.

"The law requires the placing of at least one machine in each precinct where available and when the matter was taken up with the State election commissioners they decided that my contention was right," said Mr. Masson in defining his position.

"Voters in one precinct have the same right as other voters in other precincts to use voting machines," he said.

The county election commissioners unanimously agreed with Mr. Masson in his contention that at least one voting machine should be placed in each precinct.

In all precincts where there are over 500 voters, there will be both a voting machine and Australian ballots, the county election commissioners have decided.

The election commissioners are to make their ruling on the petitions of the Farmer-Labor Party and the Independent Republican party.

"These two parties filed petitions Saturday asking that their candidates be included on the ballots and the voting machine tickets."

Richard Sipe, county clerk, explained that the election commissioners are investigating the petitions to determine if the statutes have been followed.

He said that there was some question as to the legality of using the bust of Lincoln as the party emblem by the Independent Republican party.

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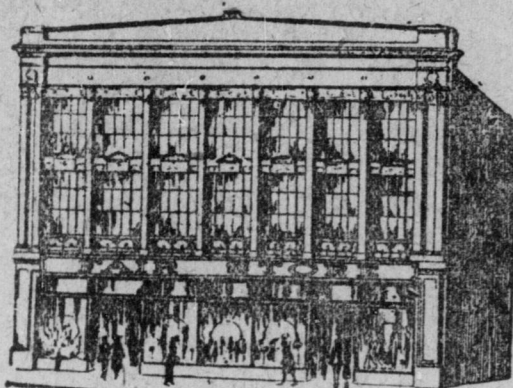
