

GOODRICH WILE IS MADE CLEAR BY REPUBLICAN

Jefferson County Man Tells of Club Used in Highway Scheme.

MENTIONS THREAT MADE

In a letter to the Daily Times, William E. Ryker, a Republican of Jefferson County, throws some light on the methods of the Goodrich administration in dealing with the good roads situation in Indiana.

The letter follows:

Madison, Ind., Sept. 28, 1920.
Editor Indiana Times—Governor Goodrich and his State highway commissioners are to be commended for their trading jaunt.

Now, I think highly of James P. Goodrich as a man, and being a Republican himself, since 1876, must hesitate to even mildly criticize official members, as we must all live in the same mud houses, but I do not consider any State worker as a national worker for years before I had the honor of knowing there was a James P. Goodrich, or even a state highway commission composed of men whose wisdom (?) as to economy (?) and highway knowledge (?) far exceed even that of Solomon.

Again, why they don't know about both economy and highway fills both the Bible and the dictionary. I, as a son, sought against them for the time and again marched up the hill and then marched down again and then offered their trading stock, tow!

DETAILS OF PROPOSED TRADE.
The proposed trade to Jefferson County two State highways, i. e. The Michigan plank road to Versailles and the State road to North Vernon if the trade offer is not accepted. Governor Goodrich only the past summer decided the Michigan plank road to Versailles to be the best road in the state.

The highway act reads that all selections of State highways shall be completed on or before the first day of April. The proposed trade is to be made of course, null and void if there is any hindrance in a legislative enactment—the attorney general to the contrary. We are so used to believe legislative agreements are the supreme laws of Indiana until declared unconstitutional by the Indiana Supreme Court and indefinitely above (as to regard any law) made by the attorney general which

must be not only intensely partisan but constitutionally spurious. Am I right? Say!

The trade offer involves a tax on the property of at least \$300,000. I suppose our Republican commissioners will make the trade, as it is Republican, and the State traders are also of our Republican house-hold, so to speak.

Now, a word as to trading stock of both parties, commissioners and highways commissioners.

First, the river road from Madison to the Switzerland County line—rejected on a former trip by the State highway commission because of the mountain overgrowth at moderately high stages of the Ohio River—trails along the river bank or at the foot of the Ohio, bounded, as you will see, by the two roads, state and county, the latter a boulevard for pleasure cars, but also a roadway for both horses and freight, as well as unnecessary expense. A well-built pike road under the township law answers every need, and the river road is still in use (see Madison Courier). It appears a fool's trade, as the deer and oxen used their own when they ran into the creek, "These warn't nothin' in them then," one expert bell said.

Now as the Michigan road part of the commissioners' trading stock, the Michigan road, the Michigan road is now and has been since its debut to the State at the Mississinewa treaty by the Potowatamie Indians, and the property of the people of Indiana and of the people of the State.

The Legislature is made by the dead a fiduciary, legislative which is due to the State highway, 100 feet wide from Lake Michigan, at or near Michigan City to the Ohio River at Madison.

ROAD BUILD.
The State built the Michigan road during the winter (?) with the money from the sale of lands (the gift from the Potowatamie Indians) about a million of dollars, and the State of Indiana, despite illegal acts of legislative bodies and county commissioners or the encroachments of abutting property owners for the Supreme Court of Indiana, the property of adverse possessors cannot be made to lie against the property of the state or any form of public property.

While the main point of the commissioners' trading stock was surely not the property of the commission to begin with, but then a certain class of automobiles are driven with only one wheel, and these are foolish.

They don't know or they would not stand for the State Highway Commission.
