

FOUNDING OF KAPPA GAMMA IS CELEBRATED

Brilliant Hotel Affair Marks
Fiftieth Anniversary of
Sorority.

One of the most brilliant Greek letter affairs of the season was the golden jubilee luncheon held by Kappa Kappa Gamma in the Riley room of the Claypool Hotel today in celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the sorority.

Gilded baskets of yellow blossoms formed the centerpieces for the small tables and masses of golden streamers combined with yellow autumn leaves were banded from one end of the speakers' table to the other carrying out the color scheme of gold.

Narrow ribbons of light and dark blue shades, Kappa colors, from which were suspended tiny silver pendants bearing the coat of arms were given as favors.
