MY HUSBAND'S FAVORITE RECIPE

GOLDEN CHIP MARMALADE.
Ingredients—Five pounds of pumpkin, five pounds of sugar, one-half of which is corn syrup, four lemons, two ounces of green ginger root, and one quart of water.

Method—Chop the pumpkin into small pieces and soak in the cold water in porcelain pan over night. Cook slowly until thoroughly tender. Then add other ingredients and cook slowly until jelly and is a light amber color.

Put in jelly glasses.
Carrots may be used in the same way, substituting the same quantity of carrots for the pumpkin.
